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

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
Summer WholeNote has a different look

City-bound or cottage bound, we hope this new arrangement (for the summer only!) meets your needs.



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

MONTH'S COVER Daniel Rubinoff -

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Daniel Rubinoff's quest to bring the saxophone into the mainstream of classical music began well over a century before his

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the scoring for most orchestral music written between 1840 and the present. Now, more than a century and a half later Rubinoff is one of a small but significant number of musicians who are determined to bring the saxophone into the forefront of art music.

Rubinoff, who grew up in Peterborough, Ontario, being a Conservatory Grade 10 level pianist when he started high

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school was initially assigned to
the percussion section of his
school music class. From that
vantage point the saxophone
looked much more interesting
than the snare drum and there his
saxophone career began. Luckily
the proprietor of the local music
store, Frank Sullivan, was an
extraordinary saxophone player, a
Canadian by birth who had
played in the Anglo-Canadian
Leather Band, (no mere town

band but an all-star band financed by a wealthy Canadian leather goods manufacturer), and in the John Philip Sousa Band. He continued his studies at McGill University and at York University, where he participated in the jazz program. About five years ago he was fortunate enough to study for a year at the Bordeaux Conservatory under Jean Marie Londeix. More recently he has been working

with concert pianist, Gloria Saarinen, in much the same way that singers work with vocal coaches, to develop his playing.

In his playing he marries the dark, intense American sound with the bright, focussed sound, much as the Québecois exponents of the saxophone are doing.

This summer, says Rubinoff will be a time for reflection and for creating new repertoire. It will however be possible to hear him perform twice, first at Applewood United Church in Mississauga (where he is director of music) on July 17 and then at Cedar Glen, where he is teaching in CAMMAC's summer program, on August 3 or 4. You can hear him any time on his CD, "The Old Castle", a collection of original compositions and transcriptions, that reveal a silky tone and equally smooth technique.





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CONCERT

Robert Silverman presented the first half of the complete Beethoven sonata cycle last summer at the Glenn Gould Studio. This summer (July 6, 7, 13 and 14, again at the Gould) he completes his epic journey, including performances of the Pathétique (Op. 13), the Tempest (Op. 31, #2), the Hammerklavier (Op. 106) and the last sonata, (Op. 111).

WholeNote publisher Allan Pulker spoke with him around the middle of June.

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Silverman's Beethoven

Q. You memorized all thirty-two of Beethoven's piano sonatas. How did you do it?

Silverman: I guess to a certain extent, a good memory is one of the gifts I have been blessed with. In a sense, too, I have been assisted by Beethoven, because most of the time everything he does has such a logic to it. If one is a good enought musician to undertake such a project, the music must speak to you in many different ways. One of the things that makes Beethoven a giant among composers is that the notes he wrote logically had to be what they were. This is usually not the way it is in the music of lesser composers. The most difficult passages to memorize were those where the same theme comes back four or five times, each time a little different from the others. But generally, when he modulates, for example, the way he gets to the new key is so logically controlled that it is not difficult to memorize.

Q. Has learning the complete sonata cycle changed your understanding of music.

Silverman: Before I started I asked my friend, Richard Goode, what he thought of the idea. He said, "If you do it, it will change your life." He was right. There is nothing that I've done that has even remotely made such a difference to the way I hear music. It has also had an enormous effect on the way I teach music. It has pulled a lot of things together for me. Just to see Beethoven's evolvement, not the development - because some of his early sonatas are just as good as the late ones, their energy and brashness is incredible - has been nothing short of a revelation.

Q. You have done and will be doing the Beethoven sonatas in other centres. Why also Toronto?

Silverman: Yes, I did the entire cycle in chronological order recently over a period of ten days in Winnipeg and will be doing them in Seattle, which is a city just as vibrant musically as Toronto, in the fall. Later in the summer I will be recording the entire cycle in Los Angeles. At this point in my career it was not so much a matter of career development as simply a wish to present this material in a major centre in eastern Canada - call it a whim.



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Coronto's Contemporary Music Calendar

Ah, summer - long days, barbecues, time at the cottage... As the 98/99 season winds to a close and most of Toronto's presenters take a well-earned break in preparation for the September rush, Hear & Now offers readers a slight change of pace. For July and August, I will suggest a few in a plethora of available CDs that permit contemporary music fans to design their own concerts at home. Many of these are new releases from the past year. So, pour yourself a glass of wine, put your feet up, switch on the stereo, and take your turn to play artistic director!

For the first programme, I would recommend exploring some works for solo instrument(s) or solo voice with symphony orchestra. A dramatic and obvious opener is John Corigliano's Oboe Concerto which even begins with the classic "tuning" of the orchestral musicians, before moving into a dizzying virtuoso display that incorporates Moroccan blowing techniques ("Collage", Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra, Bramwell Tovey (cond.), Douglas Bairstow (oboe), WSOCD 9401).

This could be followed by Canadian Jeffrey Ryan's Ophélie, a stunner for solo soprano and large orchestra. A setting of the French poem by Arthur Rimbaud, it depicts doomed Ophelia as a restless spirit, repeating her mad journey down the river nightafter-night. On the new recording by the Bowling Green Philharmonia, Myra Merritt is electrifying in the title role, and Ryan incorporates three orchestral sopranos into the texture for eerie effect ("The Composer's Voice: New Music From Bowling Green," Albany Records, Troy 321).

Next, I might return to the Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra for a change of musical pace-the "Concerto for Viola" by Glenn Buhr. This lyrical set of variations featuring a fluid and rippling orchestral texture that weaves around the solo line, is ably interpreted by WSO principal viola Neal Grip, on a recent album from CBC Records entirely devoted to Buhr's orchestral music (Winter Poems: Music of Glenn Buhr, Bramwell Tovey (cond.), SMCD 5184).

Following a brief intermission (dare I suggest you might want to replenish your drink!), comes Songs for an Acrobat by Linda Bouchard, nominated for a JUNO Award for Best Classical Composition this past year. I find this set of songs of love and death in the age of AIDS (poems by Maurice Tourigny) haunting and complementary to the tragic Ophélie earlier on the programme. The National Arts Centre Orchestra and baritone Kevin McMillan are in superb form, and the entire disc is a "must hear" ("Exquisite Fires: Music of Linda Bouchard", NACO, Trevor Pinnock (cond.) Marquis Classics, 77471 81219

Lastly, Isabelle Pannetonanother gifted female composer from Ouebec-has a brand new release dedicated to her music and containing three orchestral works. The choice here is difficult, but I strongly recommend Mimésis with flute, oboe and clarinet as featured soloists as a beautiful introduction to Panneton's impressionistic voice and more European sensibility ("Isabelle Panneton: Cantate de la Fin du Jour", Orchestre symphonique du Saguenay-Lac-Saint-Jean, Jacques Clement (dir.), Fonovox 7824-2).

In preparation for next season, you can try sampling some of the recordings by local new music organizations, composers and solo performers for your next at home concert. For this selection I recommend several pieces that take surprising and distinctive explorations on what can loosely be termed a "minimalist" aesthetic. A dramatic opening (literally) is Big Pictures by Michael J. Baker and the Arraymusic Ensemble, which was mounted as a collaboration with Dancemakers at

Harbourfront earlier this year. While the entire work is highly enjoyable (and particularly for the many WholeNote readers who got to see the show), for this listening programme you might start off with the strongly rhythmic movement "Twins" that showcases the talents of Marc Sabat (violin) and Robert Stevenson (clarinet) ("Music from Big Pictures", Arraymusic, Artifact, ART 018).

A fairly smooth connection would be to move on to the brand new CD of Music for Violin and Piano by James Tenney (Hat[now]ART 120). These superb renditions by Marc Sabat and Stephen Clarke make a wonderful introduction to Tenney's highly structured and "classical" sound world. It is again impossible to pick and choose from among a variety of aural gems. Koan, for solo violin, with its insistent and slowly transforming oscillating figure gives a continued perceptual shift that is truly fascinating. (Fans should note that the duo will present Tenney's complete works for violin and piano on a concert in the fall-September 10 at the Music Gallery).

Pianist Christina Petrowska features two works by Ann Southam on her new release of music by Canadian women entitled "Northern Sirens" (YFA 00999). The repeating cycles and patterns used in Southam's Glass Houses and Rivers are "hypnotic, calming and exhilarating at the same time". Meanwhile, on her recent Centrediscs album of Canadian works inspired by the approaches of American composer Morton Feldman, Barbara Pritchard has selected seven pieces in a primarily introspective mood (The View From Here, Centrediscs CMCCD 6298). Go for the whole disc as a moment of quiet summer "ear cleaning". As William Littler said in the Toronto Star ... "Take off your shoes, this is music for contemplation." Then, I'd leave the piano sonority to conclude this listening session with Stephen Wingfield's Teyata for two guitars. ["A Bridge Beyond", William Beauvais (guitar), Centrediscs, CMCCD 6198]. A high energy pattern piece where one guitar is slowly moved out of phase with the other, this will

leave you in a toe-tapping, upbeat mood.

The final CD concert is of chamber music. It continues with the idea of local presenters and creators, adds a couple of excellent discs from elsewhere, and celebrates the astonishing range of music created during this century.

A nice way to mark the Ottawa Summer Chamber Music Festival is opening with the Aulos Trio of that city and their new disc "Playing Tribute" (CanSona, CAM 9502). Violet Archer's 4-movement Sonata for Flute, Clarinet and Piano (1944) is one of the country's earliest major chamber works for wind instruments, and the disc also honours Archer's 85th birthday and the piece's 55th anniversary.

From a pioneer from the senior generation of Canadian composers we move to a rising young star, Chris Paul Harman's Incidents in Transition (1995) for clarinet, violin, cello, piano and percussion. This is from the Continuum Ensemble's first CD ("Continuum 1", CR-CD 9801), and its inexorable thread of tension and increasing density leads well to the next selection. (Recorded at the studio at Puck's Farm, city-bound listeners should enjoy the ambient animal sounds included at the end!)

Toronto's New Music Concerts have released "Lutoslawski Conducts Lutoslawski", a celebration of that great composer's last conducting appearance which was with NMC in 1993. Many WholeNote readers will have been in attendance. This is an important live concert of larger chamber pieces, and I recommend Fujiko Imajishi's interpretation of Chain II, a concerto for violin and chamber orchestra that alternates strictly notated writing with sections of controlled "aleatoric" or chance elements (NMC 98-1). The closer is a tribute to the late Harry Somers. His charming, neoclassical Suite for Harp and Chamber Orchestra (1949) makes ideal summer-time fare ("Spring of Somers", National Arts Centre Orchestra, Victor Feldbrill (cond.), Jennifer Swartz (harp), SMCD 5162). It is an elegant and delightful concerto that will return you to the world of 1940s

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

neo-classicism that began this programme and the theme of concerti that has recurred in this column. Of course, there are countless interesting "home concerts" you can put together over the next two months, and I wish everyone happy summer listening! 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
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• Friday, August 6: Jazz Student Concert

Another season of fine choral music-making in Toronto has come to a close affording us a ' chance to look back on some of the highlights. This city is filled to overflowing with talented, dedicated choirs offering top notch performances of a wide range of works and styles something for everybody, really.

Four leading figures in choral music in Toronto - Lydia Adams, Brainerd Blyden-Taylor, Noel Edison and Ivars Taurins - outdid themselves with exciting work throughout the season.

This has been a busy year for Lydia Adams, having taken over the conductorship of the Elmer Iseler Singers in addition to presenting full seasons with the Amadeus Choir and the Amadeus Chamber Choir. With the Iselers, Lydia gave many memorable concerts including two in February that I had the pleasure of attending. One was an all-Canadian programme featuring

several premieres by leading Canadian composers, and the other was a concert of 20th century choral music shared with the Stuttgart Chamber Choir. A highlight of the latter concert was a new piece by Harry Freedman, performed by both choirs.

It is heartening to see that Lydia is continuing the proud Iseler tradition of commissioning and performing significant new works for choir. She did not restrict this impulse to her work with the Iseler Singers. With the Amadeus Chamber Choir and the Toronto Chamber Choir, conducted by David Fallis, Lydia prepared the premiere of an important new work by Christos Hatzis at the end of April. And, with the Amadeus Choir, Lydia gave a full season of great performances, culminating with a concert with the Nexus Percussion Ensemble and featuring a new composition by Robin Engelman.

Brainerd Blyden-Taylor has also been contributing greatly to the choral landscape of the city. This year he founded the Nathaniel Dett Chorale, an important new professional

chamber choir dedicated to the performance of Afro American choral music. They had the honour of participating in the gathering at the SkyDome for Nelson Mandela when he was in town in September and they played a large role in the recent celebration of the 100th Anniversary of Duke Ellington's birth.

Brainerd continued his dedicated work as music director of the Orpheus Choir, culminating in the premiere at the beginning of June of a new large work for choir and orchestra by Imant Raminsh.

At the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir, Noel Edison took over the reins and delivered on the promised BIG season. They opened with a performance of the Berlioz Requiem, which they subsequently recorded for the NAXOS label, sang Handel's Messiah five times, gave two moving performances of Britten's War Requiem, delivered a heartfelt Brahms Requiem and teamed up with Michael Schade and others for a fun evening of Gilbert and Sullivan. They finished their season in June with town - and I use the word

two programmes with the Toronto Symphony: Mahler's 3rd Symphony and the Last Night at the Proms.

The sensational Tafelmusik Chamber Choir, directed by Ivars Taurins, gave outstanding performances of Bach's Magnificat, their annual Messiah offerings, a powerful Mozart Requiem (guest conducted by-Bruno Weill) and Handel's complete Israel in Egypt.

Making sure that young people have an opportunity to make music at a high level, the Canadian Opera Children's Chorus (conducted by John Tuttle), the Toronto Children's Chorus (conducted by Jean Ashworth Bartle) and the Toronto Mendelssohn Youth Choir (conducted by Robert Cooper) all presented first-rate concerts all year long. Of special note, as well, is the valuable work that Ann Cooper Gay and Linda Beaupré are doing with the High Park Girls' Choir and the Scarborough Bach Children's Chorus respectively.

Ivan, who in the course of our conversation observed that musicians must

Flutist Margot Rydall first heard guitarist Ivan Zilman play at a concert three years ago. His sound, unlike that of other guitarists she had worked with, was big enough to balance the sound of a flute. She proposed that they work together and the result has been successful, not only as a performing and recording ensemble but also as a generator of new repertoire.

Margot, a Toronto native, who studied with the late Nick Fiore and with English flautists William Bennett and Peter Lloyd, is a teacher and examiner with the Royal Conservatory of Music, a position she has held since the age of 18. Ivan, a native of Montréal, is a graduate of Concordia University, where he studied guitar, voice and composition. He came to Toronto in 1983, and now teaches guitar at the Scarborough Music Centre, composes, and produces CDs.

They soon discovered that the repertoire for the combination is small, and much of what is available is not very interesting salon music from the early and mid 19th century. One of their challenges would be to create new repertoire that would be "worth playing and worth

constantly re-invent themselves in order to make a living, got busy and re-invented himself as an arranger.

The results of his work, which can be heard on their CD, "DUO", released last summer, is music from a wide variety of sources. Ivan's arrangements include music by Frescobaldi, Bartók, Debussy, Billy Strayhorn, John Williams, O'Carolan, Ravel, Richard Rodgers and Thelonious Monk. Only two of the pieces were originally written for their instruments, Astor Piazzolla's "Café 1930" and Jacques Ibert's "Entr'acte".

Everybody they talk to about the recording has a different favourite track and the radio programmers love it all - it has been played on CBC Radio Two's "Disc Drive", Classical 96, and CJRT-FM to name a few. Ivan and Margot plan to spend time this summer arranging and rehearsing new repertoire for their next CD, which they will be recording next winter. They will be artists in residence this summer at CAMMAC's Cedar Glen Summer Music Centre, just 45 minutes north of Toronto. You can hear them performing together there on July 28 and 29.

The Jazz festival merry-go-round is in full swing, if that's not too much of a mixed metaphor, what with the last few days of du Maurier Downtown Jazz spilling into the first week-end of July and at least three other events in and around Toronto during July and August.

The 7th Annual Oakville
Jazz Festival kicks off on Friday
July 9th. at 7.00pm with a
mainstage concert at Town
Square. Lakeshore Boulevard
will be closed to traffic and the
music will be very much in the
swing tradition featuring two

At 8 pm Jamaican-born Monty Alexander, a pianist with a considerable following in the Toronto area, will present his jazz tribute to Bob Marley. The

Centennial Square Stage on Saturday will have music from 7 pm with The Django-style trio of Robin Nolan and the Byron Stripling Quartet, with the same rhythm section as the previous evening, Ian Bargh, piano, Rosemary Galloway, bass and Don Vickery, drums.

On Sunday, the main stage will feature two groups from 2.00p.m. to 5.00p.m. when the Russ Little Quintet and Dr. Pop and the Noise share the bill. All of the above programming is presented free.

The Beaches International Jazz Festival occupies the weekend of July 23. with free concerts in Kew Gardens and the main attraction for jazz fans will be the appearance on the 25th of T.S. 
