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

This version of "Music's Child" departs from that formula in a couple of ways: for one thing the photo on our cover is not that of a child, and for another, we are not going to ask you to guess who he is (Rufus Wainwright). In her 1971 song *River*, Joni Mitchell longed for a river she could skate away on, "a river so long it would teach my feet to fly..." Well, summer music in Ontario, and beyond, is a bit like a river that flows both ways, with home-grown musicians on the road heading out of town, and as many from afar heading in. Two Luminato concerts at Massey Hall on June 18 and 19, titled "Joni: A Portrait in Song," will celebrate Mitchell's upcoming 70th birthday and Rufus Wainwright will be one of the performers helping to make the event an occasion to remember.

Like Mitchell, Wainwright is a Canadian singer-songwriter with an extraordinary range of musical appetites—seven albums of original songs, film soundtracks, song settings of Shakespearean sonnets and a full length opera, *Prima Donna*, which received its North American premiere at Luminato in 2011. Child of two musicians, Loudon Wainwright III and the late Kate McGarrigle, Wainwright is on a bit of a magical musical carpet ride right now. At last count there were 22 concert venues listed on his ever-changing website, just between now and the end of July, in Europe, the US and the UK. Somehow he also has three Ontario appearances wedged into what is left of 2013, including one with the TSO in October!

We don't yet know if Wainwright will choose to sing Mitchell's *River* June 18 and 19 at Massey. 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# ON THE ROAD

**O**nce again, it's that time of year where we cast our nets wide and ask Canadian musicians across our community what they're looking forward to this summer, both as listeners and performers, and what their plans are for the season ahead.

Every year it's the same four questions—and yet, they call forth an array of responses as varied and unique as the musicians themselves. For example: bassoonist Nadina Mackie Jackson and oboist John Abberger, instrumentalists who would typically sit only a few seats apart in your average orchestra, are putting miles of distance between them in their summer travels. Here follows a taste of what they're up to during the coming summer months.

## NADINA MACKIE JACKSON



Canada's most visible bassoonist, Nadina Mackie Jackson has drawn attention and accolades both for her vivid style and extraordinarily musical performances. A popular teacher, Nadina works with the University of Toronto and the Glenn Gould School of the Royal Conservatory.

**What are we interrupting (i.e. what music-related activity are we taking you away from to write this)?**

Well, it is after *midnight*, yet in my fantasies, I really should be making a new reed or practising one of the concerti that I have to play next season...or the wild, wonderful music for the upcoming Toronto Summer Music Festival!

**What, if anything, are you most looking forward to as an audience member between now and September 7?**

Hearing the hot new band Alabama Shakes live at Echo Beach on June 20! The lead singer Brittany Howard is raw and gorgeous and the band is tight and beautiful...they are electric in live performance. ([alabamashakes.com/audio/](http://alabamashakes.com/audio/))

**How about as a music maker/player?**

I have a lot to be excited about...playing a Vivaldi concerto in a California winery in June for the International Double Reed conference and playing chamber music at the TSMF with some of my absolute favourite wind players and André Laplante. Oh, and a cameo appearance with the folk star Valdy on September 7 at the Rose Theatre in Brampton!

**What are you already preparing for musically beyond the summer? And (how) do your summer plans tie in with these longer term plans?**

The summer is the best time to imagine that I have enough time to get ready for everything! I am most excited about having eight concerti to perform next season, including three premieres...a bassoonist's dream! Other fun projects include reviving my nascent recorder-playing skills in the double concerto (*Carnets de Voyages*) by Alain Trudel for Guy Few and me that we will play with Orchestra London in the fall. Lots of teaching and touring the Berio *Sequenza XII* to a number of US and Quebec universities in the fall. Next season will also bring me some inspiring new collaborations, including a series of shows with Valdy ("Folk to Baroque") and a show for two percussionists and bassoon with Bev Johnston and Mark Duggan. And of course many concerts and tours with my cherished trumpeter and pianist Guy Few...this summer is giving me some valuable preparation time for a lot of traveling and performing next season.

## JOHN ABBERGER



John Abberger, one of North America's leading performers on historical oboes, is principal oboist with Tafelmusik and the American Bach Soloists. John serves on the faculty at the University of Toronto and has taught at the City College of New York.

I am at present in London, England, and have just played a short recital at the Handel House Museum this afternoon. Those who have seen Tafelmusik's "House of Dreams" program will be familiar with the fact that the townhouse where Handel lived in the London neighborhood of Mayfair is now a museum, and the museum regularly presents concerts of chamber music in one of the larger rooms that was used as a rehearsal room by Handel. I was joined by my friend and colleague, the harpsichordist Dongsok Shin from New York, and we played a short program of Hotteterre, Handel, Telemann and C.P.E. Bach. Before arriving in London, my group, Four Centuries of Bach, presented an all-Bach concert at the Tage Alter Musik in Regensburg, one of the premier early music festivals in Europe.

As an audience member, I am looking forward to hearing the concerts that will be performed by students and faculty as part of the Tafelmusik Baroque Summer Institute. There will be student performances on June 13 and 14 and a Grand Finale with students and faculty performing together on June 16.

As a performer, I am looking forward to quite a few performances that will take place between now and the end of the summer. I will be participating in faculty concerts at the Tafelmusik Baroque Summer

## MUSIC AT PORT MILFORD

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Institute and performances of Handel's *L'Allegro, Il Penseroso ed Il Moderato* with the Mark Morris Dance Company at the Luminato Festival June 21 to 23. I will be performing at the Music and Beyond festival in Ottawa in early July; and on August 17 and 18, 2013, Tafelmusik will return to Stratford Summer Music to perform two all-Bach programs, which include the "Wedding" and "Peasant" cantatas.

After all of the activities listed above I'm looking forward to relaxing a bit, but I will also be thinking ahead about preparations for the upcoming season with Tafelmusik, which will include, in addition to many interesting concerts on the regular subscription series, a tour of Japan in November, a performance at Carnegie Hall in New York in March, a return trip to Versailles with Opera Atelier in May and an exciting trip to perform Bach at the Leipzig Bachfest in June.

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# A Madrigalian Ramble Through Summer

**R**AMBLING THROUGH three months of early music performances within the space of one column might seem a bit foolhardy but it can be done; here, with the help of a few judiciously chosen madrigals, is my run-down of concert activity for the coming summer months.

*June, she'll change her tune, in restless walks she'll prowl the night.* Well, not exactly renaissance lyrics—it's Simon and Garfunkel—yet it does describe this month of transition, the last vestiges of the winter season giving way to festivals that herald the arrival of summer.

We'll start with a lovely ending to the TEMC's Musically Speaking series, which has been going on monthly at Toronto's St. David's Church since January. What better way to draw to a close than with a program of viol music? "The English Viol" features works by Locke, Purcell and others and is performed by the Cardinal Consort of Viols on June 16.

No sooner have they wrapped up their busy regular season than Tafelmusik bursts vigorously upon the scene in June with their Baroque Summer Institute, an advanced training program in baroque performance which draws musicians from around the world. Four public concerts are offshoots of this program: June 4, "Delightfully Baroque" features music by Handel, Vivaldi, Blow and others performed by the Tafelmusik Baroque Orchestra and Chamber Choir; June 9, "Musical Interlude" is a casual concert of chamber music by Castello, Merula, Bononcini and others played by members of the faculty; June 13, "The TBSSI Orchestras and Choirs" presents music by Purcell, Fasch, Vivaldi and others; June 16, "The Grand Finale" is a baroque extravaganza involving participants and faculty, with music by Handel, Rameau, Charpentier and Mondonville.

And still in June, the Tafelmusik orchestra and chamber choir appear at the Luminato Festival, joining the Mark Morris Dance Group and vocal soloists for three performances, June 21, 22 and 23,

of Handel's *L'Allegro, il Penseroso ed il Moderato*. Choreographed by Mark Morris, this piece is widely considered one of the great dance works of the 20th century.

On June 22, a step back to the medieval: Vocem Resurgentis presents "Journey into the Medieval Convent: Music of Hildegard von Bingen and Las Huelgas Codex," with sopranos Linda Falvy and Mary Enid Haynes and alto Catherine McCormack, performed at the Church of St. Mary Magdalene.

If you're in Burlington on June 29, you can experience all six of Bach's *Brandenburg Concertos* performed in two concerts, by members of the Brott Music Festival's National Academy Orchestra. And if you find yourself in Old Montreal from June 21 to 24, you have a wonderful opportunity to experience the spectacular Montreal Baroque Festival, this year titled "Nouveaux Mondes/ New Worlds." It features

*Motezuma*, an opera by Vivaldi, and too many events both grand and intimate to list here (you can find it all at [montrealbaroque.com](http://montrealbaroque.com)). It also celebrates the 50th anniversary of the Montreal Recorder Society, with workshops, masterclasses and concerts focused on the recorder.

*Festivals are in my mistress' face; and July in the Garden hath place.* Okay, it's a paraphrase (and no disrespect intended) of a madrigal by Morley, but it does point out that Toronto's Music Garden concerts are in full swing in July and that summer festivals are abounding everywhere, with lots of early music to hear. Let me tell you about a few of these:

In Exeter, the Bach Music Festival of Canada takes place July 14 to 20. While it's not all early music, there's a concert of Bach's great choruses with choir and orchestra (July 15), a performance by Cappella Intima titled "Celestial Sirens," featuring the revolutionary music of Benedictine nun Chiara Maria Cozzolani (July 16) and a full performance of Bach's *St. John Passion* (July 20).



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The Elora Festival, July 12 to August 4, presents two concerts completely devoted to Handel: July 14, *Dixit Dominus* and *Laudate Pueri* with the Elora Festival Singers and Chamber Players, Noel Edison, conductor, and on July 27, the chamber opera *Acis and Galatea*, with the Elora Festival Singers and the musicians of the Toronto Masque Theatre.

At Festival of the Sound, July 18 to August 11 in Parry Sound, some of the

most beautiful spaces in the area (such as the Museum at Tower Hill and St. Andrew's Church) open their doors to the audience for "Bach Around Town," a series of performances featuring music of Bach and others, with performers such as violinist Moshe Hammer, the New Zealand String

Quartet, harpist Erica Goodman and flutist Suzanne Shulman (July 24, 26 and 30).

Ottawa's Music and Beyond festival, July 4 to 15, has an impressive lineup of music and performers. Among the events are a performance of Pergolesi's *Stabat Mater*, an Albinoni oboe concerto and love duets by Handel, with soprano Karina Gauvin, countertenor Daniel Taylor, baroque violinist Adrian Butterfield and the Theatre of Early Music (July 6) and two performances of Bach's "Coffee Cantata" featuring the Theatre of Early Music and soloists (July 7).

Niagara-on-the-Lake's Music Niagara festival, July 12 to August 11, offers a tasteful event for those who like to explore the wineries of the region. On July 20 the Toronto Consort will appear at the Trius Winery at Hillebrand, in a performance titled "Music & Wine."

The Ottawa Chamberfest commands the city from July 25 to

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# Crashing Sonic Genres

**W**HAT HAPPENS to the new when the weather heats up and the concert seasons have ended? Does the more casual atmosphere of the summer mean that presenters, performers and audiences are ready for something more out of the ordinary? From my discoveries of what lies in store for both the curious and the lover of experimental and innovative sounds, it seems that the boundary lines between musical genres and art forms become a bit more blurred. Musical concerts, outdoor installations, performance art and electronic and sound art are all happening within the traditional and not-so-traditional music, theatre and interdisciplinary festival environments. And often, the regular indoor concert hall has been tossed aside to make room for these sounds in outside spaces or to create a more participatory audience experience. The great thing is that many of these events are happening outside the Metro Toronto area, so be prepared. Your sonic summer listening will require some travelling around the province, but that's what vacation time is for.

August 8, with irresistible concerts happening in many venues. Among them are three devoted to early music: July 28, Les Voix Baroques present "Beyond the Labyrinth: In Search of John Dowland" in honour of the composer's 450th birthday—an exploration of how Dowland's songs may change when they are performed as lute songs, as part songs or in a grey zone between the two. Also July 28, "Dowland in Dublin" features tenor Michael Slattery and the early music ensemble La Nef, who focus on the lighter-hearted side of Dowland with new arrangements of some of his well-known airs. July 31, there's a performance of Monteverdi's iconic *Vespers of 1610* with Les Voix Baroques and La Rose des Vents, directed by Alexander Weimann.

On Lamèque Island in northeastern New Brunswick, the three-day Lamèque International Baroque Music Festival takes place from July 25 to 27. There you can hear works for harpsichord, baroque flute and cello, instrumental and vocal music by Vivaldi, Handel, Corelli and Scarlatti, and choral music by Bach, Pachelbel and Leonarda.

Meanwhile at Toronto's Music Garden, the Summer Music in the Garden series is in full swing. Approximately one hour in length, concerts take place in the outdoor amphitheatre and are a wonderful way to spend a Thursday evening or a late Sunday afternoon. Two in July feature baroque music: July 4, "Mediterranean Baroque" features music from baroque Italy, Spain and Turkey, played by baroque cellist Kate Haynes, baroque violinist Christopher Verrette and theorist Matthew Wadsworth. July 18, Pallade Musica (Grand Prize winners of the 2012 Early Music American Baroque Performance Competition) presents "Terreno e vago," an exploration of the emotional polarities found in music of the Italian Baroque.

In addition to all this, the following July events take place: July 19 in Waterloo, the Kitchener-Waterloo Chamber Music Society presents Pallade Musica, fresh from their appearance in Toronto the previous day. July 20 at the Oratory of St. Philip Neri, harpsichordist Philip Fournier brings together accomplished singers and viola da gamba for "Méditations pour le Carême," with music by Charpentier, Marais and Couperin.

*Come away, come sweet love, golden August breaks. All the earth, all the air, of love and music speaks.* O dear, another paraphrase—this time apologies to Dowland—but it does serve to note that if you want to go to early music concerts in August, you'll probably have to "come away," as all the concerts I know about at this point are in widespread locations: Parry Sound, Stratford, Toronto and Kingston.

There's the continuation of the Bach Around Town series at Festival of the Sound, which this month finds soprano Leslie Fagan, trumpeter Guy Few and others performing Bach, Vivaldi and Handel at St. James Church on August 6, and violinist Julie Baumgartel and the Festival Baroque returning the series to the festival's home base, the Stockey Centre, to perform an array of baroque composers on August 9.

Tafelmusik Baroque Orchestra makes one more appearance, this time at Stratford Summer Music, with two all-Bach programs on August 17 and 18. In Toronto at Summer Music in the Garden, members of New York's period instrument ensemble, Gretchen's Muse, come to play two 18th-century string quartets, one by Haydn and one by Mozart, on August 22. And in Kingston, the St. George's Cathedral Summer Concert series features the Kingston Viol Consort on August 29.

*Oh it's a long, long while from May to December, but the concerts grow fewer when you reach September...*(Will anyone argue that Frank Sinatra wasn't a consummate madrigalist?) There's one more at the Music Garden which shouldn't be missed, though technically it falls outside the boundaries of this column: on September 12, the superb baroque cellist Kate Haynes returns to continue her six-year cycle of the Bach unaccompanied cello suites, with *Suite No. 3 in C Major*. She'll also premiere a new work by Christopher Hossfeld, inspired by the Bach.

And so good-bye to our summer tour of early music performances. Please consult *The WholeNote's* website throughout the summer for updates and additional concerts as we hear about them. ●

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**Starting off in June**, we are immediately plunged into a series of performances that are full of cross-pollinating and genre-crashing power. The big news is that Toronto's multi-arts Luminato Festival is headlining Marina Abramović, a New York-based performance artist originally from Serbia who is considered to be the "grandmother" of the performance art genre. Her work explores the limits of the body and states of consciousness, while often putting herself through extreme physical pain or tests of endurance. In 2010 during a retrospective at the MoMA in New York, Abramović performed *The Artist is Present* during which she sat immobile and in silence all day for almost three months while spectators took turns sitting opposite her. People experienced religious-like transformations as they stared back into her penetrating presence.



You may ask—what does this have to do with music? The answer is, of course, that the story of her life, along with scenes from her performance works, has been made into an opera entitled *The Life and Death of Marina Abramović*. Premiered in 2011 at the Manchester International Festival and toured to sold-out audiences in several European cities, the opera will receive its North American premiere at

Luminato, running June 14 to 17.

Conceived and directed by the legendary Robert Wilson in collaboration with Abramović, she also performs as herself and her mother alongside Willem Dafoe as narrator and male counterpart. The music was co-composed by cult pop star Antony Hegarty and ambient minimalist William Basinski, and performed by Antony in his mesmerizing and hypnotic voice. It was his cathartic musical performances and emotional vulnerability that inspired Abramović to invite him to collaborate on this opera that she describes as "a series of births and funerals of the soul."

Running in conjunction with the opera from June 14 to 23 will be her latest performance work/installation, *MAI – Prototype*. In seven interconnected pavilions in Trinity Bellwoods Park, four pre-booked participants will wear white lab coats and receive instructions on headphones as they walk through the installation for a period of two hours. Every 30 minutes a new group will begin the journey in which they will undergo the rigours of her performance practice. These encounters will be live-streamed to other locations throughout Toronto, including one at Pearson airport.

Also performing at Luminato will be the inimitable Laurie Anderson appearing as part of The Hub series of free outdoor concerts at David Pecaut Square on June 16. Anderson was one of the first performance artists to bring experimental and art-rock music to a large popular audience. Writing songs full of political edginess and performing with her invented instruments (a tape-bow violin and a computer controlled "talking stick"), she made the UK pop charts back in the early 80s.

The pop/experimental music crossover theme continues over at

the Music Gallery, in the last concert of their season's signature Pop Avant series. Curated by Tad Michalak, known for his programming of under-the-radar pop, noise, jazz and harsh electronic music, his "Burn Down the Capital Showcase" June 8 will feature three different artists. Guaranteed to set your soul on fire, the music will mix up instrumental, vocal and a wide range of electronic and ambient sounds using tape loops and synthesizers to create both an "unacceptable" and sensual evening.

Another major summer music festival happening in Toronto is the NXNE Festival that takes over the downtown streets and clubs. This year, it's exciting to see their programmers venturing into the world of sound art and co-producing three events with NAISA (New Adventures In Sound Art). These include a sound sculpture performance at the AGO on June 6, an audiovisual machine installation that runs from June 11 to 22 at the Wychwood Barns with a live performance on June 10 and a sound walk through Trinity Square on June 13, where sounds of underwater life will be projected into the outdoor urban space.

**For July**, it's off to Stratford Summer Music. It just so happens that July 18 is R. Murray Schafer's 80th birthday, and he is being honoured that night with a tribute concert featuring pieces from his *Patria* cycle of musical dramas. As part of the celebration, Schafer's visually-based scores will be on display at the Stratford Public Library from July 17 to August 25.

Schafer's vision has opened up our ears to the soundscape (a term he coined), and so it's only natural that he would create pieces

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for specific outdoor environments. His *Music for Wilderness Lake* from 1979 will be performed at 7am on July 19, 20 and 21 along the shores of the Avon River. Imagine 12 trombones spread amongst the mists of the riverbank, combined with an aria from another sunrise work—*Princess of the Stars*. Definitely worth an early morning rising. And if you're up for experiencing something quite out of the ordinary, you could sign up to participate in a workshop performance of *Asterion*—the latest in his *Patria* series. The piece is an outdoor labyrinth located near Peterborough that has a series of rooms and passages participants must navigate alone as they encounter both performers and the environment along the way. Designed to be an intense and transformative soul journey, I couldn't help but connect the dots to the Abramović installation designed with a similar intention. Happening through June and July, go to [patria.org](http://patria.org) if you are drawn to join in.

Returning to Stratford Summer Music, we find that the entire cast and crew for a concert of Canadian contemporary opera excerpts has arrived via bicycle. The Bicycle Opera Project began last summer, touring from town to city via pedal power. This year, not only will they be performing in Stratford, but also in Toronto (July 4 to 7), and on tour from July 11 to 25 in Hamilton, Guelph, Elora, Fergus, Kitchener, Waterloo, Bayfield and London, arriving in Stratford for performances from July 26 to 28. This year's repertoire focuses on telling the stories of women, featuring works from six different Canadian composers. For further details of the tour, check out [bicycleopera.ca](http://bicycleopera.ca). Also appearing at Stratford Summer Music will be the acclaimed accordionist and contemporary music champion Joseph Macerollo in six weekend concerts, starting July 20 to 21 and ending August 24 to 25.

Not far from Stratford is the town of Elora, host to a summer music festival of many different styles. Works by contemporary composers can be heard on July 13 with the New Zealand String Quartet (Jack Body) and on July 14 with the Manitoba Chamber Orchestra (Philip Glass). The Elora Festival Singers will celebrate the 100th anniversary of Benjamin Britten in their concert on July 28.

**August** takes us back to the leading edges of sound and electronics with two festivals of sound art alongside the well-loved Ottawa Chamberfest. For the last seven years in Meaford, Ontario, over the August long weekend, the award-winning composer Gordon Monahan has been directing the Electric Eclectics festival of experimental music and sound art. With camping on-site, this year's festival runs from August 2 to 4 and includes an extensive lineup of performances and installations, including New Yorkers Shelley Hirsch (experimental vocals) and Keiko Uenishi (laptop electronics), a long-awaited return by former *Musicworks* editor Tina Pearson (Victoria), a sound/light performance by Music for Lamps (Montreal) and the Sunda Duo (Toronto) with Bill parsons and *The WholeNote's* Andrew Timar.

Over in Ottawa, musical experimentation on the long weekend at the Ottawa Chamberfest begins on August 2 with the improvisation-based Element Choir. Led by Christine Duncan, who uses a series of hand cues to sculpt real-time compositions, singers from Toronto, Ottawa and Montreal will be joined by Jim Lewis (trumpet) and Jean Martin (drums) to create a wild and energetic musical ride. This year's festival also offers the New Music Now series with six concerts offered throughout the daytime hours on August 5 and 6. Performers and composers presented include pianist and multimedia artist Megumi Masaki, the Gryphon Trio (Lutoslawski, Ohana), Ensemble Transmission (Sokolović), the JACK quartet (Zorn, Lachenmann, Butterfield), choral works (Whittall, Kurtág, Berio) and a concert of works by Xenakis. In addition to this series, the festival is offering "snapshot" performances to ticket holders of the evening's Siskind Concerts, including performances by Lori Freedman and the JACK quartet and presentations on the works of John Weinzwieg and Xenakis. And if you are a fan of American composer Eric Whitacre, the Elora Festival Singers will perform three of his works in their concert on August 7, including *Sleep*—his online virtual choir hit.

Mid-month, from August 14 to 17, it's the Toronto Electroacoustic Symposium with multiple performances and presentations. Featured this year are two giants of Canadian electroacoustic music: Francis Dhomont (also the keynote speaker) and Barry Truax. Co-produced with NAISA, all concerts will be diffused using a multi-speaker spatialization system. And as the summer days slowly become shorter, the Summer Music in the Garden series presented at Harbourfront's outdoor Music Garden will feature the sounds of the TorQ Percussion Quartet on August 29. Performing compositions by Steve Reich, John Luther Adams, Richard Burrows and Daniel Morphy and an improvisation on clay instruments by the ensemble, the focus is on the natural elements of earth, water, air and fire. Overall, it's a great summer lineup for discovering what's cooking in the experimental sonic stew.

**In addition:** June 20 at Gallery 345, Kathryn Ladano on bass clarinet has two sets of improvised music including electronics and special guests.

July 19 at 7pm, Soundstreams Salon 21 presents "Summer Sound Walk," a free tour through the different acoustic spaces of the Gardiner Museum and surrounding area. The event will feature vocalist, cellist and practitioner of Deep Listening, Anne Bourne, who will lead participants in guided listening exercises and invite them to listen to the sounds of the evening mingled with improvised live music. Definitely an event not to miss! ●


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# A Slow Hot Slide?

**J**UNE IN TORONTO used to signal the beginning of a slow hot musical slide into picnic season. With concert activity winding down, many performers and audiences alike left town to relax at rural lakeside cottages. Not so these days. Now a plethora of curated festivals and single musical events fills the summer urban days and evenings for those who stay in the city. I have space to explore just a few. Therefore please excuse me if your favourite artist or musical genre is not mentioned.

**Luminato Festival:** Luminato is perhaps the signature festival opening the door to the open-air concert season. Luminato's ten-day "festival of creativity" runs from June 14 to 23. Its music components' buzzwords are "diversity," "collaboration" and the notion of seduction that goes on between artistic disciplines, programming principles articulated by festival artistic director Jorn Weisbrodt at the unveiling event in April.

Perhaps no other Luminato feature more enthusiastically embraces such a broad artistic mandate of collaboration—in this case imbued with a distinctively international music palette—as the chamber opera *Feng Yi Ting*. Running June 20, 21 and 22 at U of T's MacMillan Theatre, it was created by the respected Chinese contemporary composer Guo Wenjing. His 2004 score expertly blends Chinese and Western musical vocabulary, instrumentation and textural and harmonic worlds. The composer further-

more draws on two contrasting regional Chinese operatic styles of personal interest: Beijing opera, with its contained and polished singing, and the exuberant and highly ornamented vocalism of Sichuan opera. These disparate musical elements are effectively superimposed and fluidly recombined in *Feng Yi Ting*.

Adding measurably to the opera's allure was the production directed by the celebrated Toronto film and theatre director Atom Egoyan [also directing the Luminato performances] whose contribution "proved a significant part of its attraction, not least because, like the score, it offers a...blend of ancient Chinese and modern Western theatre technologies." This fascinating production can be viewed through multiple facets of cultural globalization: as an explorative presentation of elitist art cross-pollination and mash-up; and also as the transition of traditions. I'll be there in the audience to experience it firsthand.

In addition to *Feng Yi Ting*, I count some 11 other acts handpicked by veteran curator Derek Andrews that fill out Luminato's world music offerings. While each is worthy of our attention I only have room for a few picks. It's also worth noting that as in previous years many performances are free. Please check the Luminato website, print media and of course *The WholeNote* listings for pertinent details.

The Festival Hub at the David Pecaut Square is Luminato's outdoor stage, welcoming audiences with a sharp focus on world music. On



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Saturday, June 15 the “Reggae Around the World” concert includes the six-member pioneering Beijing group Long Shen Dao making their North American debut. Their name—a clumsy English translation is “The Way [Tao] of the Dragon God”—reflects the group’s statement that while they are “not Rastafarians, reggae music, like a warm breeze, is accessible to people no matter where in the world they come from.” Musically, the band combines rock, ska, reggae, hip hop and other popular music genres along with Chinese instruments like the *zheng* (plucked zither). “One World,” indeed.

The next day, June 16, two outstanding performers energize the Hub stage. The Tuareg guitarist Omara “Bombino” Moctar of Niger has garnered international acclaim for performances of his songs, whose lyrics often carry a message dedicated to peaceful coexistence in his war-torn homeland. Musically, Bombino marries rock—he’s a big Hendrix fan—and the *tende* music of the Nigerian nomads. Amadou and Mariam follow on stage. The couple’s infectious blend of Malian songs has since the 1990s added intercultural instrumentation to create a style dubbed “Afro-blues.”

That same evening the stage will be set for DakhaBrakha. Meaning “give and take” in old Ukrainian, the Kyiv-based quartet has invented a surprising genre of world music. While perhaps only indirectly linked to the Toronto-Ukrainian urban folk revivalist scene I explored in my May 2013 column, it certainly shares the same spirit. Founded in 2004 by avant-garde theatre director Vladyslav Troitskyi, DakhaBrakha began singing old Ukrainian village music but then added Russian, African, Indian, Arabic and Australian instrumentation to the mix. Calling the result “ethno-chaos,” their exciting transnational sound makes its North American debut at Luminato. In a bit of inspired programming, since the two have so many interesting points of intersection as well as divergence, DakhaBrakha opens for the “queen of performance art music” Laurie Anderson. I have a personal sweet spot for Anderson’s work: in the mid-70s I was hired to play bassoon in her band at the Art Gallery of Ontario.

June 20, the a cappella quintet H’Sao entertains the Hub audience. Originally from Chad, the five-voice group moved to Montreal in 2001. From that home base they continue to develop and internationally tour their taut, richly textured and rhythmically vibrant choral sound.

June 23 at 2pm, Luminato-goers are in for a rare treat: *garifuna* music indigenous to the tiny Central American nation of Belize performed by the eight members of the Garifuna Collective. Ivan Duran leads his group singing and playing a style of vivid drum, shaker and guitar-based Afro-Amerindian dance music making its Canadian debut at the festival. The Kitchener native singer-songwriter Danny Michel joins the Garifuna Collective in the next set. Together they perform songs from his 11-album career.

**Harbourfront Centre Festivals:** Long before Luminato lit up outdoor Toronto venues, the Harbourfront Centre’s summer music-centric festivals animated the waterfront. Under the banner “The World in One Place,” each summer audiences by the thousands witness emerging as well as leading world music acts with a different ethnic or national theme each weekend. Harbourfront Centre’s world music programming is divided among two locations: the main 10-acre multiple-venue site and the Toronto Music Garden further to the west along Queens Quay.

**Toronto Music Garden:** The Music Garden presents a series of free concerts most Thursdays and Sundays all summer long called Summer Music in the Garden. My first pick, on July 21, is titled “Send Me a Rose,” featuring music from China, the Middle East and Europe performed by the Lute Legends Ensemble. Three international representatives of the lute comprise the ensemble: lutenist Lucas Harris, Wen Zhao on pipa and oud master Bassam Bishara.

July 25, make a date for “Evening Ragas by the Water.” Sarangi maestra Aruna Narayan is joined by Vineet Vyas on tabla and Akshay Kalle, tanpura. The sarangi, a North Indian bowed many-string instrument, is renowned for its ability to represent the nuances of the human singing voice. In Narayan’s masterful hands we will hear it sing with emotional depth and virtuosity.

August 8 visit “A Taiko Tale of Two Cities” performed by the Nagata Shachu ensemble, one of Toronto’s favourite Japanese drumming and flute groups. Montreal’s Constantinople Ensemble performs music

with a transcontinental scope—from the African Mandingo kingdom to the Persian court—on strings and voices August 11. And deep in the heart of August (on the 18th), Swamperella, Toronto’s preeminent Franco-American hybrid Cajun music tribute band turns the Music Garden into “Cajun in the Cattails.”

**Harbourfront Centre:** There’s a themed Harbourfront festival every summer weekend. I only have space for a few selected picks, so again best refer to the listings.

July 1, the summer at the always-crowded (in a good way) Harbourfront Centre kicks off with the “Canada Day Weekend Celebrations.” As usual, world music is represented. This year the multiple award-winning Cuban-Canadian singer-songwriter Alex Cuba, with his fusion of funk, jazz and Latin pop, is among the WestJet Stage headliners.

July 5, the Lula All Stars presents a concert of salsa, followed by Chico Trujillo with his trademark cumbia punk music. July 6, the hot Latin Grammy award-winning Mexican group 3Ball MTY performs songs in musical genres variously labelled Latin house, tribal-guarachero and electronic cumbia.

July 19, 20 and 21, the three-day Tirgan Festival celebrates Toronto’s increasing connection to the visual arts, food, crafts, dance and music of Iran. The recently formed London, England-based group Ajam is the weekend’s featured musical ensemble, describing its style as “Iranian Roots Music.”

July 26 and 27, the auspicious sounds of the Jaipur Kawa Brass Band from Rajasthan, performing music from Bollywood and regional folk traditions, will resound at the WestJet Stage.

A must-have at regional weddings, they’re a must-see for Harbourfront visitors.

**Afrofest at 25:** Afrofest, Toronto’s biggest African festival, is celebrating a significant anniversary: its 25th. On June 12 the festival launches at the Gladstone Hotel ballroom co-presented by Music Africa and NXNE. Outstanding bands including Njacko Backo (Cameroon), Madagascar Slim (Madagascar), Tich Maredza Band (Zimbabwe), Foly Asiko (Nigeria) and Midnight Trinity (Botswana) will perform. Then on July 6 and 7 various music and dance groups and their respective African communities will be out in force in the green surroundings of Woodbine Park. There the real outdoor musical magic takes place in its appropriate milieu, among the food and craft stalls and the arts of Africa.

## CITY HALL SQUARE CONCERT SERIES: SOME QUICK PICKS

The City of Toronto presents a concert series Thursdays during July and August at Nathan Phillips Square starting at 12:30pm. Called “Tasty Thursdays,” in homage to the international dishes for sale, the series delivers on its motto “celebrating the world in Toronto” by presenting concerts with a global musical flavour.

► **July 11**, the NYC band Matuto steps onto the stage with its startling mix of Brazilian forró and Appalachian bluegrass. Montreal’s Bombolessé merges Portuguese, French and Spanish lyrics with an equally syncretic selection of musical genres into a festive dance-forward performance on July 25. On paper the group reads much like urban Canada sounds these days.

► **August 15**, the Ghanaian-Canadian urban folk, pop, rap and soul maestro Kae Sun will touch the assembled with his poetic observations of the human condition. Finally, on August 22, the Lemon Bucket Orkestra, Toronto’s often zany tribute to Ukrainian, Balkan, gypsy party and klezmer music, rocks the City Hall square.

Signing off for the summer, I wish all readers a relaxing and re-energizing summer full of music. Thanks for reading and listening. 🎧

# Staying Put For the Summer

**A**HHH, SUMMER'S HERE, finally. Time to hit the road, get outta town, escape the city, right? Maybe not. There is so much going on in Toronto that you might want to consider a musical "staycation" this summer, for part of it, at least.

From Music Mondays to Sunday Serenades, you can catch a local, free (or at most \$5-\$10), indoor or outdoor summer concert series performance pretty well every day of the week, from June right up to the end of August and into September. Befitting summer's easy pace, enjoy a leisurely perusal of the daily offerings below.

**Monday:** For the past 21 years, every Monday throughout the summer, locals and visitors alike have "taken a load off" at around noon, entered the inviting, downtown sanctuary of the Church of the Holy Trinity and experienced a wonderful, restorative, musical performance, presented by Music Mondays. What is different this year is that it is artistic director Eitan Cornfield's first full season at the helm of this much-loved series.

Last year, Cornfield shared some of his thoughts with us at the end of the 2012 season. This year, the

veteran former CBC radio producer offers a few more thoughts on his approach to the series, at the front end of the summer and from the vantage point of a year's worth of hindsight.

Interestingly, in his search for "organizing principles" for Music Mondays, Cornfield's language is more reflective of environmentalism than show business or the arts: he speaks of "an ecological image of Toronto's musical life," and what it takes to "survive and thrive in such an environment...the effects of climate, nurture, location."

"I began to answer these questions by considering the ecological niches that are underserved" he says. "What comfort, solace and sanctuary is there for weary shoppers, tourists, finance and IT workers in the high rise beehives of downtown Toronto, what opportunities for reflection, to recharge our artistic and spiritual batteries?...We're surrounded by pop and light entertainment, the short burst of song, the guitar riff, the advertising jungle, all fuel for ADD. And so we've redefined the mission of Music Mondays as providing food for



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thought...not just the traditional Western music of dead white guys, but the classical and art musics of all cultures...[and] a new branch of the Music Mondays organism devoted to showcasing young composers.”

“In a nutshell: we know where we fit into the environment: we provide a distinct ecological niche for both music lovers and performers, we promote diversity and accessibility, we nurture the young and the talented and we marry their music with ideas.”

Food for thought, indeed! The delectable series runs June 3 to September 30.

**Tuesday:** “Be inspired by the power and overwhelming beauty of a great cathedral organ” says the Cathedral Church of St. James website, under “Recitals and Concerts,” inviting you to find inspiration at two weekly, downtown, organ recital series. Music at Midday is the one on Tuesdays at 1pm. (I’ll get to Sunday’s Twilight Recitals later.)

Composer and St. James Cathedral’s interim associate organist, Andrew Ager, holds court for the majority of these concerts, with current artist-in-residence David Briggs performing at four of the recitals over the summer. Music coaxed from the 5,000+ pipes of the cathedral’s Casavant organ can be heard on Tuesdays from June 4 to July 30, and again on August 13 and 27, when Briggs performs music with a “French Flair” (works by Langlais, Bach, Franck, Saint-Saëns and Briggs) followed by “Music to Rouse the Spirit” (works by Bach, Briggs, Tchaikovsky, Elgar and Widor).

**Wednesday:** With three very distinct concert series falling on Wednesdays, say “so long” to the mid-week slump. St. Stephen in-the-Fields Anglican Church, in Kensington Market, starts things off in June with its weekly Concerts at Midday (12:35pm), featuring a variety of instrumentalists including pianist Richard Herriott (June 5), organists Eric Osborne (June 12) and Andrew Adair (June 19), and clarinetist Nicolai Tarasov (June 26). The series winds up August 28 with Bruce Nasmith performing double duty on guitar and organ.

Come July, two other outdoor Wednesday series swing into action. From July 10 to August 28 the City of Toronto hosts the free 12:30pm “Fresh Wednesdays” as part of its annual Summer Squares Concert Series. Munch on produce purchased from the Nathan Phillips Square

Farmers’ Market while listening to a featured Canadian singer-song-writer of the week—a perfect pairing. And if you feel like an evening away from the bustle of downtown, the Artists’ Garden Cooperative obliges with its truly eclectic Plein Air Salon Garden Concerts. Taking place throughout July and August, at 7:30, these lovely garden concerts offer everything from folk/roots music and jazz to country blues and

Bossa Nova. Attend the AGC’s free launch party on June 25 at 4:30 for a sampling.

**Thursday:** Thursdays will pose an even greater challenge to your concert-going plans, with four series to contemplate, in June at least. Nine Sparrows Arts Foundation wraps up its regular Lunchtime Chamber Music recital series at Christ Church Deer Park, with four June concerts. NSAF has been running the weekly noon hour recital series since the fall of 2009, presenting local musicians—often graduate performance majors from U of T’s Faculty of Music—in “a unique chamber music program designed to provide showcase opportunities for rising talent.” You can catch some of this young talent at 12:10 on June 6, 13, 20 and 27; mind you, that last recital happens to include some “seasoned” talent: *The WholeNote*’s own Allan Pulker on flute.

The pairing of music and food has always been a winning combination, especially when the former is free and the latter cheap. Once again, the City of Toronto has married the two for “Tasty Thursdays” at Nathan Phillips Square, inviting you to relish “international dishes (for \$7 or less) served up by a variety of Toronto restaurants, while enjoying free live music from the stage, including roots, blues, reggae and Latin sounds.” The series runs Thursdays, from 11am to 2pm, with concerts at 12:30, July 11 to August 29. Yum!

As it’s done for the past 13 summers, Harbourfront Centre continues to gift us with Summer Music in the Garden, a glorious outdoor series in the entrancing Toronto Music Garden. Every Thursday from July 4 to September 12 (except September 5), people wend their way to the Garden, to set out blankets and chairs, or claim space on the terraced seating area, in anticipation of the evening’s live performance at 7pm. In her curatorial statement, Tamara Bernstein refers to the season’s

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“joyous eclecticism,” an apt and inspired description of what Bernstein has programmed: “music from 17th-century Europe; string quartets by Haydn, Mozart, Beethoven and more; South Asian ragas; thundering taiko drums; music for African kora, viola da gamba and Persian instruments; fiddling from Cajun, Celtic, French-Canadian and Norwegian traditions; several world premieres—and of course the garden’s ‘patron saint,’ J. S. Bach!” Irresistible, yes? The magic of the Garden awaits you...as it does on several Sundays at 4pm, throughout the summer, as well.

The final Thursday series I want to mention here is the newest kid on the block, or rather, in the park, St. James Park, former home of the Occupy Toronto camp. Hosted by the St. Lawrence Market Neighbourhood BIA, Music in St. James Park was conceived and coordinated by local writer and music lover, Bob Neighbour, a spry (by all accounts) 87-year-old who, while in agreement with the Occupy message, wanted to revive his neighbourhood park, have it known and frequented for its loveliness rather than its political past. As Nancy Miller, Neighbour’s wife, wrote in an article for the online publication *Good News Toronto*, August 2012, Neighbour “just wanted to sit, on a warm evening, and listen to beautiful music.”

Armed with the old adage “they can only say no”—something my wise, Jewish mother taught me—Neighbour approached his neighbourhood BIA about supporting a free music series in the park, and they liked the idea. Musicians were lined-up, local businesses came on board and “occupy the gazebo” translated into beautiful music emanating from the park’s gazebo, which hadn’t been used in decades. In its inaugural year there were six concerts; this year there are eight at 7pm, ranging from those classical music boundary pushers, the Annex Quartet, on June 20, to the spirited Boxcar Boys performing their unique mix of wild gypsy, Dixieland jazz, klezmer and folk music, on August 8. Last year I attended the second concert. Two greats, Jane Bunnett and Hilarion Durán, graced the gazebo with incredibly exhilarating, sexy Cuban music. It was a perfect evening. Here’s to eight more.

**Friday and Saturday:** It seems that there’s a dearth, generally, of Friday and Saturday summer concert series. Perhaps presenters figure the city empties out on weekends with its citizens making a beeline for “the cottage.” For those of us who remain in the city (by choice or otherwise), local pianist Gordon Murray kindly fills the void with his two, one-man “mini-series.” On Fridays (June 7, 14, 21, 28 and August 23 and 30) it’s Piano Potpourri, 1:10pm at Trinity-St. Paul’s United Church, featuring an assortment of selections from classics, opera, operetta, musicals, ragtime, pop, international and other genres; you’re encouraged to bring your lunch. The three Piano Soirée concerts (June 29, July 27, August 24), at 8pm on Saturdays, also at Trinity-St. Paul’s, offer up more formally programmed recitals with works ranging from Kalman’s *Dream Once Again* to Liszt’s *Un Sospiro*. Check the listings for details.

**Sunday:** In contrast to the scarcity of Friday and Saturday concerts, Sunday’s abundance includes afternoon concerts in gardens, twilight church recitals and evening serenades in the square. You already know about two of them: Cathedral Church of St. James’ Twilight Recitals at 4pm (June 2, 9, 16, 23) and Harbourfront’s Summer Music in the Garden, also at 4pm (June 30; July 21, 28; August 11, 18, 25; and September 8, 15). And there’s yet another of the City of Toronto’s Summer Squares Concert Series. This time it’s “Summer Serenades” at Mel Lastman Square, featuring swing, jazz and big band music, at 7:30pm, on seven consecutive Sunday evenings from July 7 to August 18. Last in our survey of Sunday, City of Toronto Historic Sites presents Music in the Orchard. These popular outdoor performances in June at the Spadina Museum, begin at 1:30pm and feature jazz and improvised music (June 2); works by Mozart and beyond for wind octet (June 9) and classical to modern works for flute, clarinet and bassoon (June 16). As its press release suggests, “Bring a blanket. Bring a picnic. Bring the whole family. Pay what you wish.” Instructions for a perfectly pleasant Sunday afternoon.

**Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday, Friday and Saturday:** And last but certainly not least is Toronto Summer Music Festival. Originally conceived as a summer series, with concerts every other day or so over a four-week period, TSMF now commands mid-July to the beginning of August with an astonishing array of local and imported talent gracing its three stages, five days a week. For those whose idea of a “staycation” includes total musical immersion, TSMF is, more than any other, the in-town festival for which to stick around or come home.

Convinced to stay put for a bit? Good. Enjoy the music and summer on! ●

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
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# Singing the World

**I**N MY LAST COLUMN I promised to address the reluctance of audiences to attend performances of new music, even to the point of vetting concerts over the phone to make sure nothing on the program is too modern.

One reader wrote in to observe that time often sifts through and discards the inferior music of past eras, leaving a core of proven masterworks that form the basis of performers' standard repertoire; with a finite amount of time and resources for concert-going, it is reasonable to concentrate on works that have some guarantee of quality and durability.

I wrote back and pointed out that time was actually an unreliable source and judge of quality. Many composers whose work was neglected to various degrees after their deaths were revived by later musicians, found an audience, and now are considered important. Into this category fall Bach, Mahler, Vivaldi, Monteverdi, as well as composers popular with early music audiences such as Dowland, Gesualdo and Biber.

Hearing well-known works repeatedly can be both pleasurable and a way to a deeper understanding of these compositions. But there is great fun, satisfaction and real excitement in feeling that you are singing (or listening to) something new and unusual.

The reader and I agreed in a pleasant email exchange that an active, engaged audience was needed, to be receptive to musicians who champion both new and neglected works. Only with these kind of listeners can time and successive audiences find which composers speak to them most deeply.

For those interested in being part of a vanguard of new, varied and interesting choral projects, there are fascinating opportunities this July and August at Stratford Summer Music.

The festival, somewhat overshadowed in the past by the town's renowned Shakespeare festival season, has in recent years emerged as a hub of innovative summer programming. This year, their focus is on choral music.

This year Stratford Summer Music is inviting interested choral singers of all ages, abilities and experience to participate in a series of events titled "We Sing the World - a Choral Symposium," over the course of four days, July 18 to 21. The musicians leading rehearsals, panel discussions, concerts, workshops and lectures are a mixture of Canadian and international choral music experts. The festival's two themes are the environment and world culture; the workshops and discussions will address how world culture and environmental concerns are influencing and shaping choral music in the new century.

Participants will form a chorus that will rehearse during the symposium and perform a concert at the end of the weekend. Registration information can be found at [stratfordsummermusic.ca](http://stratfordsummermusic.ca).

The festival's programming is stylistically diverse, situating classical choral singing within the larger context of world music and modern vocal techniques. Concerts will include appearances by the famous Vienna Boys' Choir (July 26 to 28); Johannesburg's Mzansi Youth Choir (August 22 to 24); Anúna, the Irish national choir (as part of the choral symposium); and an August 4 concert by the Toronto Mass Choir, one of the city's best gospel music ensembles.

The festival is also devoting a substantial part of the summer to an exploration of the work of legendary Canadian composer R. Murray Schafer, perhaps the most internationally renowned Canadian composer alive. On July 18, the opening day of the choral symposium, Schafer celebrates his 80th birthday.

Schafer has been an iconoclast from the beginning, rebelling against the stultifying conventions of the classical concert paradigm from the 1960s onward, setting his music dramas in lakes and woodland locales. Schafer's innovations seem prescient now, as young classical musicians are venturing away from the concert hall with increasing frequency and looking to bars, clubs and other non-traditional spaces to try to connect with audiences. (His *Music for Wilderness Lake* will be performed along the Avon River at 7am from July 19 to 21).

At the same time, there are strongly traditional elements in Schafer's work that connect him to European Romantic strains in myth, opera and literature. His work often depicts metaphysical struggles between good and evil, light and dark. Sexuality, particularly female sexuality, is sometimes presented as a destabilizing, threatening force.

Activities focusing on Schafer's work include an 80th birthday dinner July 18, an exhibition of hand-drawn scores opening July 17 (Schafer's scores are notable for their unusual artistry and draftsmanship, incorporating visual imagery as well as traditional music notation), lectures, symposia and concerts.

Other concerts and festivals of note:

At the Elora Festival, there are many opportunities to see the Elora Festival Chorus, which is appearing in at least eight separate shows. Notable concerts with an anniversary theme are "Coronation: Crowning Glory" on July 20, which is a celebration of Queen Elizabeth's 1953 coronation, and a centenary celebration

of the birth of Benjamin Britten on July 28.

The Tafelmusik choir and orchestra take part in a very intriguing blend of dance and music on June 21 and 22, as part of the Luminato Festival. The ensembles accompany choreographer Mark Morris' interpretation of Handel's *L'Allegro, il Penseroso ed il Moderato*.

Handel's setting combines John Milton's two poems, *L'Allegro* and *Il Penseroso*, in a metaphysical dialogue. *L'Allegro* (roughly, the lively one) is happy, active—something of a party animal, actually—and *Il Penseroso* (the introspective one) is pensive, ruminative, even a bit gloomy. The two poems are companion pieces that explore opposite approaches to life, spirituality and sensation.

Handel and his librettist interspersed the two poems, creating a dramatic tension between the classic Eros and Thanatos principles. Recognizing that whichever text came last would get the final word on the argument, they added new text and a third character, *il Moderato*, that attempts to mediate and find a middle path between the two extremes.

Whether this succeeds as a dialectical synthesis is a matter of opinion. The new text comes down rather on the side of *il Penseroso*, and *l'Allegro*—whose approach strikes me as more fun—is treated as a bit of an unruly teenager in need of curbing. But this was very much



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in harmony with the aesthetic of the time, which was ultimately about balance, grace and proportion in all things. Handel's music mines the text and finds many opportunities for word painting and expressiveness. The show also incorporates the images of poet/draftsman/painter William Blake and has been a hit since its premiere in 1988.

The Kokoro Singers, based in the southern Ontario region, perform "Earth, Air, Fire, Water" on June 9 in Guelph and on June 15 in Dundas. The concerts feature works by Hatfield, Whitacre, Ticheli and Thompson.

On June 15 the Cabbagetown Classical Youth Choir performs its annual spring concert, which features excerpts from Mozart operas and other works. The choir's mandate is to give singing opportunities to children of families in difficult economic circumstances, and they are soliciting funding to help with this worthy goal. Please visit their website at [indiegogo.com/projects/ccyc-annual-spring-concert](http://indiegogo.com/projects/ccyc-annual-spring-concert). The concert is the finale of an operatic workshop for youth, and features a special appearance by legendary Canadian bass-baritone Gary Relyea.

From England, the Bradfield College Tour Choir is visiting Canada. This youth choir has performed all over Europe, and in the US as well. Their musical director, Anne Wright, is originally from Toronto. They are singing in Niagara Falls on July 4, and in Toronto on July 3 and 6. The July 3 concert takes place at Casa Loma.

Hamilton's Arcady Singers sing several concerts as part of the Brott Music Festival, which takes place in venues in Burlington, Hamilton and Ancaster. On June 20 they will be featured in a performance of Beethoven's *Ninth Symphony*; on August 1 they take part in a



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concert performance of Verdi's *Aida*; and on August 15 the festival's grand finale is Mahler's *Symphony of A Thousand*, which is really an oratorio for choir and soloists.

On July 28 the Hart House Singers perform "The REAL Glee: Songs made famous by Yale, Harvard and Hart House Glee Clubs." Glee—part songs for small ensembles—have been around for centuries. The modern high school glee club is a mixture of standard choir and show choir, a kind of choreographed choir/music theatre hybrid. But up to the middle of the 20th century, glee club music was a collegiate phenomenon with a particular aesthetic and style. It combined folk songs, school songs, 19th century parlour music and archaic sounding Latin lyrics in a manner that has almost disappeared. This concert—which will also feature modern songs that might be more familiar to the *Glee* television audience—is a chance to revisit and enjoy this charming repertoire.

The Elmer Iseler Singers appear in Parry Sound at the Festival of the Sound on July 18, in a mixed concert of popular Canadian music that includes Srul Irving Glick's *The Hour Has Come*. This tuneful and accessible piece, premiered by the Toronto Mendelssohn Choir in 1985, has become something of a Canadian choral standard. The Toronto Mendelssohn Choir also appears at the festival on August 11, singing Orff's *Carmina Burana*.

Speaking of unconventional locations, the Westben Festival (various dates between June 8 and August 4) takes place in Campbellford, which is in the mid-Ontario region of Northumberland County. All the concerts take place at the Westben Barn. Westben Youth and Teen Choruses will be taking part in a version of Bizet's *Carmen* July 4 to 7, a concert of selections from Broadway musicals June 9 and a performance of Beethoven's *Choral Fantasy* June 29.

That's all, folks. Enjoy the music and have a great summer!

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


# The Songs of Robert Burns

**R**OBERT BURNS WAS not a musician but he liked music; he was especially fond of traditional Scottish airs. He wrote several times that his main goal in writing texts for them was to preserve the music. After Burns' death, that process was reversed by composers like Schumann and Loewe, who wrote new settings for Burns' texts.

More recently, Benjamin Britten did so in *A Birthday Hansel*, a song cycle

beautifully performed at the Royal Conservatory on April 14 by soprano Lucy Fitz Gibbon and harpist Ingrid Bauer.

The relation between text and music in Burns is actually more complicated than his own statements would suggest. *O My Love is Like a Red Red Rose* was first published by Pietro Urbani, an Italian musician active in Scotland. Burns gave him the words of the song and essentially told him to use them as he saw fit. Urbani then came up with his own composition, an elaborate setting featuring two violins, viola and harpsichord, with an instrumental introduction and with the notation "Largo con Molta Espressione." James Johnson republished the song in 1797 and used the tune that Burns had himself suggested, *Major Graham*. Then in 1821, long after Burns' death, Robert Archibald Smith proposed an alternative tune, *Low Down in the Broom*. It is that tune that is now generally used. The case of *Auld Lang Syne* is different but also complicated. Burns wrote, in a letter, that he "took it down," that is to say he took the words down, from an old man's performance. Johnson published it in 1796 to an old tune, but two years earlier Burns had already written to another publisher, George Thomson, that he did not like that tune; he added that there was another, which "you may hear as a Scottish country dance." It is that other tune that everyone now knows. It is clear then that in some cases Burns wrote, or wrote down, the texts first and then looked for a traditional melody that he liked and that fit metrically.

Several Toronto musicians sing Scottish songs. Lorna Macdonald has done so in a number of her recitals, Allyson McHardy included a set in a recent concert and there is a fine performance of Burns songs on an ATMA CD by Meredith Hall with Ensemble La Nef. There will be another chance to hear songs by Burns in a concert entitled "The Star of Robbie Burns," with Virginia Hatfield, soprano, and Benjamin Covey, baritone at the Church of the Redeemer, June 7. R.H. Thomson will narrate Burns's life, while the second half of the concert will feature songs from the musical *Brigadoon*. The pianist is Melody McShane. And just in case that is not enough, the ticket price includes tea and shortbread. The concert will be repeated at the Festival of the Sound at the Charles W. Stockey Centre for the Performing Arts, Parry Sound, but with a different soprano, Charlotte Corwin. A different

Burns/*Brigadoon* concert will be given at the Westben Festival in Campbellford with Donna Bennett, soprano, Colin Ainsworth, tenor, and Brian Finley, piano, July 13. You will also be able to hear Burns' songs *Ae Fond Kiss* and *Auld Lang Syne* in a concert titled "A Celtic High Tea" at St. John's Church, Ancaster, August 11.

Virginia Hatfield comes from Campbellford and began her vocal studies in her early teens with Donna Bennett. Subsequently she studied at the University of Toronto, first as an undergraduate at the Faculty of Music and then as a graduate student at the Opera School. She has been a member of the Ensemble Studio of the Canadian Opera Company and she has sung in a number of recent operas and concerts in Ontario: Sokolović's *Svadba-Wedding* for Queen of Puddings, Handel's *Orlando* for Opera in Concert, Bizet's *The Pearl Fishers* in Hamilton and, most recently, the final concert of the Aldeburgh Connection (in which she also sang a Burns song, *Afton Water*, in the setting by Britten). This summer she will be part of an Opera Gala at the Festival of the Sound in Parry Sound, July 20, with Gabrielle Prata, mezzo, Mark DuBois and David Pomeroy, tenors, and Peter

McGillivray, baritone, and she will be singing Broadway songs at the Westben Festival in Campbellford with Brett Polegato and James Levesque, baritones, July 25 to 28; in the fall she will repeat her role in *Svadba* in Philadelphia, and next February she will sing the Naiad in Richard Strauss's *Ariadne auf Naxos* for Pacific Opera Victoria.

I first heard Benjamin Covey in the role of Pluto in Monteverdi's *Il ballo delle ingrate* (Toronto Masque Theatre). The part goes down to a low E-flat and I was pleased that the company had

found such a deep bass. Then later Covey sang a setting of *Gather Ye Rosebuds While Ye May* in a lyrical baritone voice. He is clearly a singer with an impressive range. As he himself puts it: he is a baritone with a lower extension. Covey studied at Wilfred Laurier and subsequently in the MA program in the Opera Division at the University of Toronto. He was a member of the prestigious Merola program at the San Francisco Opera, where he sang the role of Belcore in *L'elisir d'amore*. He also became a friend of the soprano Valentina Fleer, who sang Adina. As he says, the Elixir of Love worked and the two will marry this summer. In the opera it is, of course, the tenor who gets the girl (tenors always do), so perhaps we can see Covey's success as the baritone's revenge. The wedding will keep him occupied this summer but in 2014 he will sing for the Scottish Opera, as part of the Commonwealth Games, in *The Friendship Oratorio*, a work with a libretto by Alexander McCall Smith.

**Toronto Summer Music:** Summer in Toronto means the Toronto Summer Music Festival, which will begin on July 16 and end on August 3. A major event will be the Toronto recital debut of the bass-baritone Philippe Sly at Walter Hall, July 23. Julius Drake is the collaborative pianist. The program consists of works by Ravel, Duparc, Wolf and Schubert. Sly was a member of the Canadian Opera Company a few years ago and gave distinctive performances in several small roles. He was heard at the Westben Festival at Campbellford last September in Samuel Barber's *Dover Beach*. A concert on July 19 at Walter Hall will feature the baritone Sanford Sylvan, who will sing Poulenc's *Le bal masqué*.

An important part of the Festival is the participation of 12 emerging artists. Three of them have performed in Toronto recently: the sopranos Lucy Fitz Gibbon, Meghan Lindsay and Jennifer Taverner. Their mentors are Elly Ameling, Sanford Sylvan and Julius Drake; the young artists will also perform in the Mentors and Fellows concerts on July 27 at Walter Hall and in the free Outreach concerts on July 25 and 26 at Heliconian Hall.

**Other events:** Two concerts at the Heliconian Hall: Magdalena Risberg, soprano, and David Huang, piano, perform works by Peterson-Berger, Grieg, Sibelius, Schubert, Ravel and others June 10; and Kira Braun, soprano, and Linda Condy, mezzo, present a benefit recital for the Weekend to End Women's Cancer June 16. Peter Barnes, baritone, sings song cycles by Finzi, Fauré and Schubert at Islington United Church also on June 16. Zorana Sadiq, soprano, and Christopher Baga, piano, perform works by Grieg, Wolf and Rachmaninoff at the Church of the Holy Trinity, July 8. Colin Ainsworth is the tenor soloist in a concert by the Tapestry Chamber Choir at St. Andrews Presbyterian Church, Newmarket, June 9.

**And at the festivals beyond the GTA:** at the Elora Festival Suzie LeBlanc, soprano, and Julius Drake, piano, will give a recital of French art songs and German lieder on July 28. There are further performances of this recital at the Westben Festival in Campbellford July 30 and at the Ottawa Chamberfest August 1.

Donna Bennett will be the soprano soloist in Mozart's *Regina Coeli*, at the Westben Festival Theatre in Campbellford on June 29. Also at Westben: a program of Shakespeare, Noel Coward, and Flanders and Swann, with David Kemp, actor/singer, and Brian Jackson, piano, July 14.

At the Brott Music Festival there will be a royal baby shower for Kate and William in which Elizabeth Herera and Valerie Tryon will perform music by Debussy and Mozart June 26.

At Festival Alexandria June 30, there will be a Bloomsday Celebration featuring Edwardian and Irish music referred to in Joyce's *Ulysses*. The singers are Beverly McGuire and Kathleen McAuliffe, sopranos, and Ashley Foot, tenor (3689 County Road 45, Alexandria, June 30 at 3pm).

At Stratford Summer Music, Brooke Dufton, soprano, will sing *Music for Wilderness Lake* by R. Murray Schafer July 19, 20 and 21.

At the Ottawa Chamberfest, Measha Bruegggosman, soprano, will perform Poulenc and Gershwin July 26; Melanie Conley, soprano, and Bud Roach, tenor, will sing Gershwin later that night. ●

**T**HIS SUMMER there is not quite as much opera on offer in town as there has been in past seasons. Out of town, however, there is a burgeoning of opera productions and opera-related concerts.

June: In Toronto Luminato ([luminatofestival.com](http://luminatofestival.com)) has included opera in each of its past six seasons. This year the focus is on the Canadian premiere of *Feng Yi Ting* by Chinese composer Guo Wenjing. The opera had its world premiere at the Spoleto Festival in May 2012 and is notable because the three organizations that commissioned the opera (Spoleto, the Lincoln Center Festival and the Chinese organization Currents Art & Music) chose Toronto's own Atom Egoyan as the stage director.

The opera, only 55 minutes long, explores the tale told in the 14th-century novel *Romance of the Three Kingdoms* of Diao Chan, one of the fabled Four Beauties of ancient China, whose seductive charms ignite an empire-threatening rivalry between a ruthless warlord and her lover, the brave general Lu Bu. It focuses on the pivotal moment when Diao (Shen Tiemei) and her lover (countertenor Jiang Qihu) meet in the *Feng Yi Ting* ("Phoenix Pavilion"), where she urges him to eliminate his nemesis. One of China's most respected contemporary composers, Guo fuses Chinese and Western classical styles to create a score that sounds at once both ancient and modern. The opera is sung in Mandarin with English and Mandarin surtitles and runs for only three performances from June 20 to 22. For ticket holders Egoyan leads a pre-performance talk about the creation of *Feng Yi Ting* each evening at 7:10pm at the MacMillan Theatre.

The only other large-scale opera-related production in Toronto this summer is the latest opera/theatre hybrid created by Austrian playwright Michael Sturminger called *The Giacomo Variations*. Torontonians may recall that Luminato presented Sturminger's *Infernal Comedy: Confessions of a Serial Killer* in 2010 starring John Malkovich as the killer whose victims, rather than speak, sang selected arias from Baroque operas. *The Giacomo Variations* also stars Malkovich, this time as the famous adventurer Giacomo Casanova (1725–98), whose memoirs, *Histoires de ma vie*, were so scandalous they were not published in full until 1960. In Sturminger's piece the dying Casanova looks back on his life where his conquests and opponents are characterized by selected arias from the Mozart/Da Ponte operas accompanied by Orchester Wiener Akademie and conducted by Martin Haselböck. This time Show One ([showoneproductions.ca](http://showoneproductions.ca)), not Luminato, presents the work which runs June 7 to 9 at the Elgin Theatre.

For operas in concert in June, one must look to the Toronto Summer Opera Workshop productions led by vocal coach Luke Housner (lukehousner.com). Concert performances with surtitles are the culmination of intensive 10- to 14-day workshops whose purpose is to expose young singers to the rigours of learning roles. The TSOW performs Mozart's *Don Giovanni* from June 4 to 6 and Humperdinck's *Hänsel und Gretel* from June 12 to 14, both held at St. Simon-the-Apostle Anglican Church.

July-August: For staged operas with piano accompaniment in Toronto in July and August, Summer Opera Lyric Theatre is always reliable. This year SOLT (solt.ca) is presenting Handel's *Alcina* (1735) in Italian on July 26, 28, 31 and August 3. Running with it in repertory is Bellini's *Capuleti e i Montecchi* (1830), also in Italian, on July 27, 31, August 2 and 4 and Puccini's familiar *La Bohème* sung in English on July 27, 30, August 1 and 3. All performances take place at the intimate Robert Gill Theatre on the University of Toronto campus.

For opera outside Toronto, one need only look at the increasing number of summer music festivals. The operatic highlight of the 26th annual Brott Music Festival in Hamilton (brottmusic.com) is a concert performance with the National Academy Orchestra of Verdi's *Aida* on August 1 at Mohawk College's McIntyre Performing Arts Centre. Sharon Azrieli Perez sings the title role with David Pomeroy as Radames and Emilia Boteva as Amneris. Other opera-related concerts include "Last Night at the Proms Meets Gilbert & Sullivan" on July 27 with David Curry singing all the comic male roles and Brian Jackson conducting the NAO.

This year the Elora Festival (elorafestival.com) also includes opera in concert. On July 27 it presents Handel's *Acis and Galatea* with the Elora Festival Singers and musicians of the Toronto Masque Theatre conducted by Noel Edison. On August 3 it presents Gilbert and Sullivan's



*The Mikado* with Jim White as Ko-Ko, Allison Angelo as Yum-Yum, Thomas Goerz as Pooh Bah, Jean Stilwell as Katisha, David Curry as Nanki-Poo and Michael Cressman as the Mikado. Edison conducts the Elora Festival Orchestra and Singers. Opera-lovers should also note that to celebrate Verdi's bicentenary, the Elora Festival opens on July 12 with Verdi's *Requiem* with COC favourites Yannick-Muriel Noah, Anita Krause, David Pomeroy and Robert Pomakov as the soloists.

A bit farther from Toronto is the Highlands Opera Studio in Haliburton (highlandsoperastudio.com) where Richard Margison is the artistic director. On August 6, 8 and 16 it offers a program of "Operatic Highlights." On August 11 there is a concert "Richard Margison & Friends" where the famed tenor and some of his closest friends come together to raise funds to support the HOS. The summer culminates in fully staged performances of Verdi's *La Traviata* on August 23, 25, 27 and 29. Ambur Braid and Luiza Zhuleva will trade off in the roles of Violetta and Annina, Adam Luther sings Alfredo and Geoffrey Sirett sings Germont. Valerie Kuinka directs and Miloš Replický conducts.

To the west, the ever-expanding Stratford Summer Music (stratfordsummermusic.ca) is presenting the unusual group known as The Bicycle Opera Project, July 26 to 28. The group (bicycleopera.ca) was

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# New, Again

“EVERYTHING OLD IS new again,” wrote Peter Allen, the Australian songwriter and performer, in one of his memorable hits of the 1980s. As if to prove the point still holds, a spate of high-profile musicals sweeps the GTA and beyond this summer, all but one more than 30 years old. Already attracting crowds at the Shaw Festival Theatre in Niagara-on-the-Lake, *Guys and Dolls*, “a musical fable of Broadway” based on stories and characters created by Damon Runyon during the 30s, originated as a 1950 adaptation by Jo Swerling and Abe Burrows, with music and lyrics by Frank Loesser. The most-produced American musical in history, the show has won nearly every possible award and still scores accolades. Given its strong production at the Shaw, “odds are that [it] will become the biggest box-office hit in the Festival’s history,” writes J. Kelly Nestruck in *The Globe and Mail*. It’s a safe bet that the Festival indubitably is banking upon.

By now, the plot of *Guys and Dolls* is well known—at least, to the demographic that appreciates the stylized depiction of Depression-era Broadway that Runyon creates for his motley collection of gangsters, gamblers, chorines and molls. Sky Masterson, a high-roller (played by Kyle Blair in the current production) makes a bet with Nathan Detroit (Shawn Wright), a shady entrepreneur who’s organizing a craps game for his cronies, that he can woo a pious missionary from the Salvation Army—Sarah Brown (played by Elodie Gillett)—and fly her off to Havana. While the sinner and saintly flirt, fight and fall in love, Nathan and his frustrated fiancée of 14 years, Adelaide (Jenny L Wright), a performer at the Hot Box burlesque, conduct a parallel romance that leads to the same destination—the altar, a common site for happy endings in frivolities like this. To chronicle their progress from craps to the church, Loesser provides one of the greatest scores ever written for a popular entertainment—a roster of songs that defines the term “classic” and sets the standard for American musical comedy.

A riskier gamble is the Shaw Festival’s other musical offering this season—*The Light in the Piazza*, book by Craig Lucas, score and lyrics by Adam Geuttel, which opens in late July. One of the few musicals written in the 21st century to receive a major Canadian production this summer, *Piazza* also evolves from a literary source—a short story set in the 1950s when anxieties about romance and repression ran rampant, a circumstance not incidental to the show’s subject.

Originally a short story written by Elizabeth Spencer in 1960, *The Light in the Piazza* follows Margaret Johnson, a wealthy matron from the southern U.S. (played by Patti Jamison) as she chaperones her daughter Clara (Jacqueline Thair) on a summer trip to Florence. There, a love affair between Clara and Fabrizio, a young Italian man (Jeff Irving), forces Margaret to face the fact that her future is overshadowed by the past. While still a small girl, Clara suffered a concussion that stunted her mental and emotional growth. Now a beautiful young woman, she retains the innocence of a child, which becomes more than usually troubling after she announces her intention to marry her Italian paramour. Watching Clara’s love blossom, Margaret grapples with her responsibility to her daughter and the girl’s fiancé. Should she acquiesce to love and celebrate the young couple’s marriage, or should she intervene to stop it?

Writing about *The Light in the Piazza*, Jackie Maxwell, artistic

formed to bring Canadian music to people who might otherwise have little opportunity to hear it and to work to close the distance between audiences and opera singers through performances in intimate spaces. It focuses on operatic repertoire that deals with contemporary issues. At Stratford’s Revel Caffè it will perform two programs. The first will include scenes from the operas *Rosa* by James Rolfe, *Slip* by Juliet Palmer and *Cake* by Monica Pearce. The second program features excerpts from *Little Miss All Canadian* by Lemit Beecher, *The Enslavement and Liberation of Oksana G.* by Aaron Gervais and *Trahisons liquides* (in French) by Stacey Brown. The performers are soprano Larissa Koniuk, mezzo Michelle Simmons, baritone Geoffrey Sirett and tenor Will Reid with music director Wesley Shen at the piano, Katherine Watson on flute and Leslie Ting on violin. Michael Mori is the stage director. Outside Stratford, The Bicycle Opera Project will make stops in Toronto, Hamilton, Elora, Fergus, Kitchener, Waterloo, Bayfield and London.

To the northeast of Toronto the Westben Arts Festival (westben.ca) in Campbellford is mounting a fully staged production of Bizet’s *Carmen* on July 5, 6 and 7. The UBC Opera Ensemble is directed by Nancy Hermiston, and Leslie Dala conducts the Westben Festival Orchestra. On July 21 Richard Margison and John Fanning, with accompanist Brian Finley, offer “Sunday Afternoon at the Opera,” a celebration of Wagner and Verdi in honour of the composers’ bicentenaries. On July 25, 26, 27 and 28 well-known singers Virginia Hatfield, Brett Polegato and James Levesque take a break from opera to explore musicals from *The Wizard of Oz* to *Les Misérables*.

If you’re looking for major rarities and would rather stay in Canada, simply head to Quebec. The Montreal Baroque Festival (montreal-baroque.com) runs June 21 to 24. In concordance with this year’s theme “Nouveaux Mondes,” on June 21 Ensemble Caprice and Atelier Lyrique de l’Opéra de Montréal present the Canadian premiere of Vivaldi’s opera *Moteczuma* [sic] from 1733. The opera focuses on the last hours of the Aztec king Moctezuma II (died 1520) as he languishes in captivity under the Spanish conquistador Hernán Cortés. This being an opera, librettist Girolamo Alvisi Giusti had no trouble in inventing a love story involving Fernando’s (i.e. Hernán’s) brother Ramiro and Mo(c)tezuma’s daughter Teutile. The score, thought lost, was discovered in 2002 in Berlin, though part of Act 1 and most of Act 3 are missing. Various baroque music experts have created reconstructions of the missing portions, the first concert performance since the 18th century occurring in 2005 in a version by Federico Maria Sardelli. For the MBF, Ensemble Caprice’s conductor Matthias Maute has created his own reconstruction.

Besides this, La Compagnie Baroque Mont-Royal will present a concert called “L’Opéra de Frédéric II” on June 24 which will explore the type of opera that the Prussian king encouraged to flower at court after his ascension in 1740. Fans of ballet should also note that Les Jardins Chorégraphiques and Les Boréades de Montréal have teamed up to present a famous ballet more often recorded than seen—*Les Éléments* of 1737 by Jean-Féry Rebel (1666–1747), which depicts no less than the creation of the world out of chaos. The performance takes place June 24.

Not far from Montreal is the site of the Festival de Lanaudière (lanaudiere.org). The highlight of the festival is a concert performance of Wagner’s *Lohengrin* (1850) on August 11 with Yannick Nézet-Séguin conducting the Orchestre Métropolitain and Choeur de l’Orchestre Métropolitain de Montreal. Brandon Jovanovich sings the title role, Heidi Melton is Elsa, Andrew Foster-Williams is Telramund and renowned soprano Deborah Voigt makes her role debut as Ortrud.

Since 2013 is also the 200th anniversary of the birth of Verdi, the festival is offering a starry “Gala Verdi” on August 3 with Jean-Marie Zeitouni conducting the Orchestre du Festival et du Choeur St-Laurent. Soprano Marjorie Owens, mezzo Jamie Barton, tenor Russell Thomas and baritone Quinn Kelsey are the soloists. The concert will feature arias, duets, ensembles, choruses and overtures from 13 of Verdi’s operas from *Nabucco* to *Falstaff*.

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director of the Shaw Festival, suggests that “actors and singers adore being in an Adam Guettel musical as they have to push themselves to the limit musically and emotionally.” I asked Paul Sportelli, musical director of the show, if he agreed. “Actors do love singing Guettel,” he replied. “He knows how to write for the voice and his compositions are tremendously powerful, so singing actors like to be a part of bringing that kind of composition to life.” Sportelli also suggests that “as much as one can analyze and admire [Guettel’s] composition, there is something in it that is powerful and emotional and transcendent...that can’t be fully explained...” One reviewer of the original Broadway production (2005) made a similar point, observing that “the songs complicate rather than simplify the

characters,” which led him to reflect that “the musical is conventionally thought of as the lightest and most disposable of theatrical genres, but *The Light in the Piazza* is on every level more profound than [many dramas].”

*Piazza* is one of the few bilingual Broadway musicals to succeed with an audience, many of its characters being fluent only in Italian. The bilingual book and lyrics make the piece more difficult to rehearse than other musicals, Sportelli notes, adding that

“the dialect requirements (English with an Italian accent, English with a North Carolina accent), along with the complexity of the score” require extra rehearsal time. Mounting the production in the close confines of the Festival’s Court House Theatre also presents challenges. Using an orchestration that Guettel wrote for piano, harp, double bass, cello and violin rather than a full orchestra, Sportelli and the play’s director, Jay Turvey, hope to turn the liabilities of the space to their advantage.

“It’s the orchestration I used when I did *Piazza* at the Arena Stage in Washington DC in 2010,” Sportelli explains, “and it is very effective: lush while achieving a more intimate ‘chamber’ feel. The five players will be on stage at the back and will be visible.”

Another show that uses reduced orchestration to meet the demands of a smaller house opens in early June for a two-month run at Toronto’s Panasonic Theatre. Like *Guys and Dolls* and *The Light in the Piazza*, it also stems from a literary source, but one less time-specific. Written in the late 1970s, *Cats* qualifies as both a cultural phenomenon and a large-scale musical, a fact that often overshadows its considerable artistic achievements. Based on T.S. Eliot’s *Old Possum’s Book of Practical Cats* (1939), the show premiered in London in 1981 as a high-concept suite for dancers, with music composed by Andrew Lloyd Weber and Trevor Nunn (its director) and choreography by Gillian Lynne. The following year, the same creative team opened *Cats* on Broadway under the guidance of Cameron MacIntosh, its producer, where, as in the West End, the show garnered instant acclaim and set attendance records. Besides running for 21 years in London and 18 years on Broadway, *Cats* has since been translated into 22 languages and played around the world. The seven Tony Awards it won in 1983 represent only a few of the many honours it has accumulated during its travels.

The first of the so-called mega-musicals, *Cats* cost five million dollars to produce on Broadway in 1983, a figure that established a new benchmark for large-scale musical theatre. Given its unusual subject and eclectic score, this cost is remarkable. Much has been

written about the initial production, primarily because the cast rehearsed without a book, plot or structure—a situation that regularly led to confusion. Inasmuch as the performers all play cats, they were required to learn a complex physical vocabulary to execute Lynne’s stylized choreography which, while much copied, has never been surpassed. Although the show is sung-through, the music intermittently accompanies spoken text, though never dialogue. Musical forms include an overture that incorporates a fugue for three voices, power ballads, rock solos and chorale recitative as well as novelty numbers that highlight the attributes of the various cats that gather for the Jellicle Ball—an annual event in this feline fantasy that provides the show’s inciting premise. Meeting in a junkyard (the musical’s only set), the phalanx of 22 cats waits for the moment when Old Deuteronomy, a revered elder, will choose the most deserving celebrant to ascend with him to heaven. Defying expectations, he eventually names Grizabella, a shabby old cat shunned by the others, whose signature song “Memory,” introduced at the end of Act One, provides the musical motif that repeats throughout the show to lend it a melancholic tone as indelible as the song’s soaring melody.

The small stage of the Panasonic Theatre is a far cry from the wide proscenium and lofty fly gallery of the Elgin Theatre where *Cats* received its all-Canadian premiere in 1985. The brain-child of Marlene Smith who, along with Tina Vanderheyden, raised over three million dollars to finance the show (unheard of at that time), *Cats* gave Toronto’s commercial theatre a long overdue kick-start. The production ran for two years before touring the country and returning for a second sold-out run at Massey Hall in 1987. Responsible, in large measure, for the restoration and refurbishment of the Elgin Theatre, its success had even more important consequences. As Mel Atkey writes in his book *Broadway North*, the production proved “that there was an audience for musicals in Toronto, the talent to perform (if not yet to write and direct) them and money to be made. When the suggestion of bringing in *Les Misérables* and *Phantom of the Opera* cropped up, it was feeding time at the zoo.”

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# And Now On Solo Didgeridoo...

Marlene Smith acknowledges that she enlisted a number of investors from her initial team for the new production of *Cats* that she undertook at the suggestion of her son Geoffrey, with whom she has formed a new company, Nu Musical Theatricals. To direct, she turned to Dave Campbell, who has mounted the show elsewhere in Canada. Interestingly, she sourced her choreographer and musical director from the original Canadian production: Gino Berti, a member of the initial Canadian cast, is charged with recreating Lynne's West End choreography, and Lona Davis, another member of the original cast, serves as musical director. It was Davis who explained the show's orchestration to me, noting that "due to space limitations we have a reduced eight-piece orchestra. The arrangements are based on an existing ten-piece version [for which] Mark Camilleri has created new programming for the three keyboards that updates some of the original sounds." She adds that "the orchestra performs on a scaffold upstage behind the set" and that "all the performers are miked."

A new *Cats* for a new generation? Perhaps, given that the set employs the designs of Rose and Thistle, a Toronto-based company whose digital technology attempts to add depth to the Panasonic's shallow stage by projecting layers of holographic imagery. While such effects are welcome, even without them the old becomes new again as fresh faces enliven a show that has passed the test of time. The same can be said of a number of other productions that grace our stages this summer—too many, in fact, to allow more than a mention here. *Tommy*, the acclaimed "rock opera" that began as a record album by The Who in 1969, receives a new production at the Stratford Festival under the direction of Des MacAnuff, one of its originators, that opens late in July and continues until mid-October. Another all-Canadian production of an oldie but goodie that promises high-tech staging, the show is sure to attract a new generation of theatregoers interested in experiencing a milestone in the history of musical theatre.

Reaching back even further, *Anything Goes*, in a touring production by New York's Roundabout Theatre that won the Tony Award for Best Revival in 2011, also arrives in July for a one-month run at the Princess of Wales Theatre. Written in 1934 by the inimitable Cole Porter, this frothy confection is perfect summer fare—and the second most-produced musical in the American theatre canon, right behind *Guys and Dolls*. If you haven't seen it before, you're in for a treat. And if you have, well, as with all the other musicals available to you this summer, it's worth seeing again—especially in this rousing production that revels in the joy of staging the past. Who knows, you might even want to sing along. I'm sure you'll know the songs. **o**

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IN LAST MONTH'S issue I referred to a number of concerts by small ensembles. Since then I had the pleasure of attending a very different program by small ensembles. In the most recent of their intimate offerings, the Naval Club of Toronto hosted a return of members of the band of HMCS York. This band, one of several reserve force bands in Toronto, has amassed quite a talented group of musicians. Time was when the membership of such reserve bands constituted a mix of skilled amateur members along with one or two school music teachers. Today this band can boast that close to 75 percent of their members hold degrees in music, including some doctorates.

The program opened with a duet for alto trombone and harpsichord by an early composer that I had not heard of, a predecessor of Leopold Mozart and Michael Haydn. The trombonist, Leading Seaman James Chilton, holds a Ph.D. from the University of British Columbia and is one of a few who are introducing this instrument to their audiences. Three hundred years ago the alto trombone, and its larger brother the tenor trombone, enjoyed significant status as solo instruments. However, the use of trombones as solo instruments declined for almost 200 years. Beethoven didn't use trombones in his symphonies until his *Fifth*, where they appear in the final movement.

In the 20th century the tenor re-emerged as a solo instrument, but with a few exceptions, the alto has languished to this day. It was great to hear of its return. (On my return home after that performance, I rushed to play a CD of concertos for alto trombone and orchestra by Leopold Mozart and Michael Haydn.)

The rest of the program consisted mostly of performances by various combinations of brass instruments. A trombone quartet chose lesser known works by 20th century composers including American Arthur Francenpol and Briton Malcolm Arnold. A quintet brought us back to the present with their version of *When I'm 64*.

Other than one oboe solo, it was almost all brass. I said "almost" because L.S. Chilton suddenly digressed from his various sizes of trombones to introduce an original composition, his *Opus 1 for Solo Didgeridoo*. The possibility of a naval musician in full uniform



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performing on such an instrument in public was beyond my wildest illusions, but there he was. For those not familiar with the construction or origins of the didgeridoo, it is a traditional instrument made by Aboriginal craftsmen in Arnhem Land in Northern Australia. While this was a factory-made instrument, the original native Australian instruments are made from the trunks of eucalyptus trees, the cores of which have been hollowed out by termites. He hopes to get one of those “termite crafted originals” in the future. While I once had the opportunity to make sounds on a didgeridoo, I can’t say that I ever came close to playing anything resembling music on it.

Traditionally, in concerts, naval bands always play their official “regimental march” *Heart of Oak*. This time, as a bit of a spoof, all of the participating musicians treated us to a vocal rendition of that in four-part harmony.

Since the concert at the Naval Club had such a significant trombone component, this might be a good time to recount a story of a special trombone in my life. Many years ago, having played a tenor trombone for most of my life, I suddenly had the urge to try a bass trombone. So I visited a dealer to inquire about such an instrument. The price of the new Vincent Bach instrument that I tried was beyond my budget at the time and I left empty-handed. That same evening, during a rehearsal, a total stranger who had been sitting behind the trombone section leaned over and whispered

in my ear, “Do you know anyone who would like to buy a bass trombone?” I almost jumped out of my skin. When I asked for details, the gentleman handed me a piece of paper with his name “Tommy” and suggested that I phone him.

The next day I visited him. There it was; a genuine New York Bach bass trombone. For those not familiar with the Bach instruments, Vincent Bach was an Austrian trumpeter who moved to New York shortly after the First World War and set up shop to make trumpets and trombones. In later years he moved to Mount Vernon and subsequently sold the business, whereupon the operation was moved to Elkart, Indiana. Those early New York and Mount Vernon instruments are coveted by brass musicians for their craftsmanship and tone quality. The asking price was surprisingly low. Tommy explained that he had suffered a stroke and could no longer play. He just wanted the horn to have a good home. (Some time later he confessed that he had an ulterior motive. Another individual in the same trombone section, who we’ll call Joe, had been hounding Tommy to buy the trombone. Tommy couldn’t stand Joe and wanted the instrument to be played beside him where Joe could eat his heart out.)

Over the years I have wondered about the history of the instrument. There is still the name Harry Stevenson—bass trombonist for the Toronto Symphony for many years—marked on the inside of the case. A few weeks ago I had the opportunity to learn a bit more about my treasure. Tedd Waggoner, the Bach instrument specialist from Elkart, was giving a presentation on the evolution of the early Bach instruments at Long and McQuade in Toronto. I took my instrument to show to him. In this presentation he pointed out how Vincent Bach had maintained meticulous records of every instrument produced with all specifications, dates and names of customers. Waggoner had been able to convince the current management to retain these individual record cards on all of the early instruments. Shortly after his return to his office I received a copy of the card with all of the details. It was completed on April 22, 1941, and sold on January 16, 1945, to a Colin Campbell in New York. How and when did it get from New York to Harry Stevenson? Were there other owners? I feel like a genealogist trying to trace the ancestry of my treasure. Are there any readers who might shed some light? For the benefit of those who might wish to own such a horn, I already have a list of trombonists hoping to be

mentioned in my will. Finally on the topic of trombones, the Sheraton Cadwell orchestras are looking for one or two experienced trombone players to join them. For details visit their website at [sheraton-cadwell.com](http://sheraton-cadwell.com).

So much for some of the musical events in my life these past few weeks. What is on the horizon for the summer months? Since there will not be another issue of *TheWholeNote* until September, I set out to determine what would be happening in the community music world over the next three months. With a few exceptions, the community bands in this part of the world served up a deafening silence as far as news of their activities was concerned. With a dearth of information at hand, I turned to band websites to see what they were reporting. In one case, the band in question greeted me with the news of their next great performance in October 2012. Another gave all sorts of detail about their forthcoming trip in September 2010. A third gave a list of every performance in the past three years, but nothing about the future. Come on folks, tell us what you are doing.

Here’s some of what we do know. Steffan Brunette and the summertime-only Uxbridge Community Concert Band will be performing their usual two concerts plus a ceremony with the local branch of the Royal Canadian Legion. The Festival Wind Orchestra will feature all movie music in their spring concert on June 22 at 2pm, at Crescent School. The Newmarket Citizens’ Band has a busy schedule, including the Veterans Day Ceremony at the Newmarket Cemetery (June 9 at 1:30pm), the Aurora Canada Day Parade (July 1 at 10am), the Newmarket Canada Day Fireworks Concert (Richardson Park, July 1 at 7pm), the Orillia Aqua Theatre (August 4 at 6:30pm) and a Clarington Older Adult Association concert (September 22 at 12 noon). The Concert Band of Cobourg is offering a Coronation Concert Celebration series with performances in Toronto June 2, in Kingston June 9 and in Cobourg June 15. As in previous years there will be a series of regular concerts by several bands at the Orillia Aqua Theatre in Couchiching Beach Park and on the Unionville Millenium Bandstand.

While it is definitely not a community band, there is a new small ensemble in Toronto that warrants some attention. Conductor Simon Capet is back in town with a new chamber orchestra with the very musical name Euphonia. There will be two main differences in their performances. They will be performing in small, non-traditional venues and will not be wearing any kind of formal attire.

Rather than viewing these small venue performances as an innovation, the members of Euphonia consider it a return to the past. As Capet points out, public concerts in the days when these composers presented their works were not in large austere concert halls. They were lively social gatherings in the taverns of their day, where the musicians were surrounded by their audiences as they enjoyed refreshments and conversations along with the music. As in those early days, the musicians will be in the centre of the room, not up some distant stage remote from their audience. Tentatively, these concerts will be on the second Monday of every month, with their next concert, consisting of music of Mozart, C.P.E. Bach and Haydn, at the Lula Lounge June 10 at 8pm.

Turning to happenings in September, it seems appropriate to return to naval matters. On the weekend of September 14 the Concert Band of Cobourg, in their role as the Band of Her Majesty’s Royal Marines Association (Ontario), will be travelling to Plattsburgh, New York. For several years now the band, and a considerable group of friends, have made an annual trek to participate in ceremonies commemorating the Battle of Plattsburgh on Lake Champlain. Yes, there was a naval battle on Lake Champlain with no fewer than 30 ships involved. It took place on September 11, 1814, just before the signing of the Treaty of Ghent, and was the final battle of the War of 1812. I might just make the trip there myself this year.

# ‘Those Lazy Hazy Crazy Days of Summer’

**F**IRST OF ALL, just in case you read last month’s column and are wondering how my adventure in Vienna ended, I am out of the woods, so to speak, and back home safe and relatively sound. The last leg—no pun intended—was a direct flight from Vienna to Toronto bringing to a close a trip to remember.

I was allowed out of the infirmary a good deal less infirm than when I went in but had to wait a few days before I could get the flight home and so I spent the night before I left at Jazzland where I enjoyed a lovely evening listening to guitarist Mundell Lowe.

Lowe is not a household name in jazz but he is one of the truly important names in the world of jazz guitarists.

There are guitar players who have relatively high profiles throughout their careers—Barney Kessel, Bucky Pizzarelli, Charlie Christian, Ed Bickert, Eddie Lang, Herb Ellis, Jim Hall, Joe Pass,

John McLaughlin, John Scofield, Kenny Burrell, Pat Martino and Pat Metheny are a few of those who attained that recognition.

Then there are those who opted for a life largely spent in studios or in rhythm sections of big bands or as sidemen—Barry Galbraith, Carl Kress, Eddie Durham, George Van Eps, Joe Puma and Mundell Lowe fit that description.

Now here’s the thing about Mundell: he still sounds great, both playing and verbalizing—we had a most enjoyable conversation and his first question was, “How’s Ed?” as in Bickert. He knew that Ed had stopped playing, but simply wanted to know how he is.

I suspect Mr. Bickert has no idea just how highly regarded he is in the international jazz community.

But more on the subject of Mundell Lowe.

In the 50s and 60s he worked in New York with the NBC and CBS orchestras and on the *Today Show* studio band. He then moved to California and met Jackie Cooper, the famous child actor turned executive who at the time was head of Screen Gems. As a point of interest, at age nine Cooper was also the youngest performer to have been nominated for an Academy Award as best actor for the film *Skippy* in 1931. Mundell got work composing for a number of the Screen Gems TV and film projects but eventually was frustrated by the fact that he was doing more writing than playing and so in the 80s he turned back to his first love—playing. A sampling of the artists with whom he has played includes Billie Holiday, Lester Young, Charlie Parker, Helen Humes, Charles Mingus, Sarah Vaughan, Carmen McRae, Benny Carter and Stan Getz—and he is still going strong.

Oh, and one thing I should mention is that Mundell Lowe is 91 years young!

Other musicians who lived long and active lives and hit the 90 mark include Eubie Blake, Dave Brubeck, Benny Carter, Jay McShann and Artie Shaw.

Speaking of longevity, how many of you know the name Al Gallodoro? Not many, I would bet, and yet among musicians—and some of the names may surprise you—he is held in high esteem—

Jimmy Dorsey—“the best saxophone player that ever lived!”

Buddy DeFranco—“Art Tatum, Charlie Parker, Heifetz, Perlman and Gallodoro are unequalled and may be for years to come.”

Benny Golson—“Amazing! The world should know Al Gallodoro. He is a hero in my eyes and in the eyes of the many others who know him.”

He was an American clarinetist and saxophonist who performed from the 1920s up until his death at age 95 and played with Isham Jones, lead alto sax with the Paul Whiteman Orchestra and bass clarinet in the NBC Symphony Orchestra under Arturo Toscanini.

In 1945 Warner Brothers made a movie very loosely based on the life of George Gershwin called *Rhapsody in Blue* and it features the famous opening clarinet glissando.

Well, that was Al Gallodoro.

He was much in demand as a studio musician throughout his career and in 1958 Ferde Grofé composed *Gallodoro’s Serenade for Saxophone and Piano* but today he is one of the largely forgotten heroes.

But for every musician who made it into their 90s there were too many who didn’t even see 30.

Bubber Miley died of tuberculosis in 1932 at the age of 29, as did Fats Navarro in 1950 at the age of 26 and Charlie Christian in 1942 at the age of 25. Clifford Brown died in a car crash in 1956 at the age of 25 and alcoholism claimed Bix Beiderbecke in 1931 at the age of 28.

Mention of Beiderbecke reminds me of a story that Wild Bill Davison, the fiery cornet player from Defiance,

Ohio—he could not have come from a more aptly named town—told me about the days of prohibition, through which he drank his way consuming whatever might be available. He explained that during prohibition musicians loved to play Detroit, where there was a very popular speakeasy which was the destination

after the gig for a lot of resident and travelling jazzers and where he would sometimes hang with Bix.

What made Detroit such a haven for drinkers was the fact that just across the Detroit River was Windsor where there was no prohibition.

The speakeasy that Bill was talking about solved their problem by having cases of booze loaded on the Canadian side onto a sort of raft which was then hauled, not over the river, but under it on the riverbed to avoid detection by the authorities! Some nights the customers would arrive at the booze can before the shipment, but as Bill said, “It was worth the wait to get that real Scotch.”


## MIDSUMMER NIGHTS (AND DAYS)

The summer stretches out ahead of us with its usual crop of festivals firmly establishing the fact that straight ahead jazz musicians, with few exceptions, can no longer fill a large concert hall or marquee and more and more the real jazz is to be found in smaller venues.

Toronto audiences have long memories and with Roy Thomson Hall, Massey and Koerner Hall presenting on a year-round basis at least some of the few “name” jazz groups it makes it a gamble to bring them back too soon, thus reducing the number of “stars” available at festival time.

Is it possible that the days of big-time jazz festivals which rely on non-jazz acts in order to sell tickets and satisfy sponsors are drawing to a close? Is it perhaps time to call them music festivals since obviously a real jazz festival, which hardly exists any more, should not even try to compete with concert hall programming? Calling it a music festival would still attract the jazz fans to the jazz content of the festival and defuse the criticism of non-jazz acts. Sponsors, who are primarily interested in having presence in the community would still be happy and I’m sure wouldn’t mind if they changed the name. It’s as close to a win-win scenario as I can come up with, at least for the moment.

Getting back to the value of less being more, my own experience



is that the best jazz I've heard has been played in smaller venues where the artist is in close contact and able to communicate with the audience.

I heard Miles Davis in a New York jazz club (I remember he was drinking milk with a shot of whisky in it) and in a concert hall setting and I know for sure that I preferred the music I heard in the club. I can say the same about Dizzy Gillespie, Oscar Peterson, Sonny Stitt, Roy Hargrove, George Shearing and so on.

The concert hall as a jazz venue probably goes back to the Carnegie Hall performances by Paul Whiteman in 1928 and Benny Goodman in '38.

The "Jazz at the Phil" concerts started in 1944 and firmly entrenched the concert hall as a suitable performance space for jazz. In the case of JATP it was an opportunity to hear an all-star gathering of jazz greats on one stage and it became in effect a touring jazz circus, expanding its activities into Europe by 1952. The last North American tour was in 1967 but went on sporadically in Japan and Europe.

Frankly, the concerts were often an opportunity for "grandstanding" but inevitably a lot of good music was also played. But, getting back to my point, I did attend a JATP concert in Glasgow and I enjoyed, for example, the Roy Eldridge I later heard in a club setting more than the Roy I heard with JATP.

Anyway, if you do read this before the Toronto festival is over, dig carefully and you will find much that is worth making the effort to attend—but the real jazz is in the smaller venues or free on the festival site.

Talking about real jazz, some of you might remember that last summer I had a series of hour-long radio shows on Jazz.FM91 called "Journeys In Jazz with Jim Galloway." Well, I have a second series coming up in mid-June airing on Sunday afternoons at 4pm. The music is selected from my own collection and I hope you can give it a listen. I think you'll enjoy the music, featuring some of my favourite instrumentalists and vocalists with a few oddball recordings thrown in. Some of the choices might be new to you, even if they are old by today's standards.

Enjoy. See you in the next *WholeNote* in September when I can be your fall guy.

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

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# Friday Free-For-All at JazzFest

**S**UMMER SOLSTICE RENAMED: the Toronto Jazz Festival is calling Friday June 21 Free-For-All Friday, as participating venues all over the city will charge no cover. Tough choices that night: David Buchbinder's lush tones at Lula Lounge; the swinging hi-hat of NYC veteran Victor Lewis at The Rex; the sparkling voice of Molly Johnson enchanting a packed house at the Jazz Bistro...she will be back the following evening, by the way, with tickets priced at \$35.60.

On Free-For-All Friday, trumpet player Brownman will be playing at the Mây Cafe on Dundas West, but if you miss that gig, sweat ye not: he plays a gig every single day of the festival, culminating in a two-night CD release event for his Brownman Electric Trio CD featuring NYC bassist Damian Erskine.

"It's actually 13 gigs in nine days," the Trinidad-born, New York-schooled, Toronto-based Brownman tells me. "Two private gigs don't appear on the schedule...It's pretty crazy. One's gotta stay organized. My book literally has an hour by hour breakdown of what I'll be doing over those nine days. There's so much going on behind the scenes! Like all the logistics of flying in the mighty Damian Erskine, who appears on the new Electric Trio CD and who will be the featured bassist during the two-night CD release extravaganza on June 28 and 29. Dealing with his airport pickups, hotel accommodations, trying to set up a bass masterclass for him that I'll host, and a hundred other details means essentially every hour of each day has to be carefully planned out. And, of course, the entire week leading up to the fest is stacked with rehearsals. For every one of those gigs, there's a corresponding rehearsal. The one that makes me the most nervous is the big Freddie Hubbard Tribute to launch the fest. We're doing two sets of Freddie's material—his acoustic material in the first set, and a set of his electric stuff—and only have a single rehearsal to mount all those tunes. That'll be a nail-biter for sure. But the cats are some of the best in the city, so I'm not that worried. I'll definitely need to be taking my vitamins that week."

A leader of no fewer than seven groups, Brownman dabbles in many

varieties of jazz, from Latin to electric, and is also actively connected to the urban music scene.

"You'll notice I'm at Mây for a lot of the Jazz Festival dates. I did a hip hop show there in winter and ended up hanging out with the owners until 4am that night. That led them to ask me if I'd be interested in booking and curating their whole Jazz Festival program. It's a great space with huge potential for live music and they were happy to give me artistic licence to book as I pleased, so that led to the exhausting work of putting that program together. It's a strong cross-section of some of the city's finest multi-faceted jazz artists and will hopefully provide the city with another venue with strong jazz programming during the TD Fest."

Speaking of strong programming, it is tough to choose just one quick pick for every day of the festival, but here goes:

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**A toast to jams:** Between the Festival's mainstage acts and the club series one will find far more than swing and bop: blues, country, roots, soul, folk, hip hop, avant garde and electronica. There's really only one thing this reporter wishes there was more of: jam sessions. Jazz by its very nature is about improvisation and nowhere does this become more quintessential than when fate unites players from across continents to collaborate on the likes of "It Could Happen to You." On the bright side, when the festival is over you can enjoy some jazz jams all year long in Toronto.

Chalkers Pub is the home of Lisa Particelli's Wednesday night 8pm to 12am session, GNOJAZZ, which stands for Girls' Night Out Jazz (where gentlemen are welcome too). Now in its eighth year and still going strong, the vocalist-friendly evening is a cherished place for singers of all levels to hone their performance chops, form musical connections and become inspired by their peers. By providing a safe musical environment that includes the rock solid rhythm section of Peter Hill on piano and Ross MacIntyre on bass, Particelli has given countless individuals a place to make music comfortably, thereby strengthening this community immeasurably. Most importantly, it is not a competitive diva-fest but rather a friendly place for singers and listeners to gather, share, learn and grow. Hundreds of singers have attended over the years, including vocal teachers and students, professionals and amateurs alike.

"The singers have been wonderful, of course, but it's the loyal listeners that keep it going," says Particelli. "These are people who simply appreciate the talent of others and make a special point to come out and support them. Without the support of listeners, the jam session would not be able to survive, so we are truly grateful for our regulars."

Over the years Particelli has instilled education into the jam in various ways: celebrating Jazz Appreciation Month, organizing workshops by guest artists and for the past three years by fundraising for a vocal jazz scholarship at Humber College. The money is raised by special concerts billed as "GNOJAZZ All-Star Vocal Showcases" and the next one takes place as part of the Toronto Jazz Festival on Sunday, June 30 from 7pm to 10pm at Chalkers Pub. Congratulations to the 2013 recipient of the scholarship, Daniella Garcia!

Gathering inspiration from Lisa Particelli, some of the singers who have been coming out to GNOJAZZ have started jam sessions of their own, including Pat Murray who is starting up her "Jazz Jam-Gria" at

417 Restaurant & Lounge on the Danforth, Tuesday nights. This is particularly good news considering that The Rex Hotel, home of the Classic Rex Jazz Jam, has recently taken the jam out of their programming. At Jam-Gria, instrumentalists are encouraged to bring their axes, with vocalists also welcome:

"Jam-Gria is an east end jazz jam that encourages all levels of musicians to sit in with a house band of mentors or colleagues," says Murray. "It draws Toronto's A-level players as well as those musicians taking their first leap of faith into the world of improvisation. The new digs at 417 are exquisite! Very chic decor and cuisine to die for!"

Also on the east side of town, Laura Marks started a Monday night session called Bohemian Monday earlier this year at Rakia Bar.

"Last New Year's Eve I dropped in to the Rakia Bar New Year's Eve party," recalls Marks. "The owner said that they'd like to set up a regular program of music there and asked me if I would work with him on a jam that is mostly jazz but open to other genres. We started in February and have gradually been building it ever since. Up until last Monday it was held every two weeks. Now it will happen every Monday."

# Editor's Corner

I WILL BEGIN with apologies to Terry Robbins. Due to his personal itinerary this month several discs arrived too late to be included in his Strings Attached column which, I must admit, I am happy to be able to add to my own collection. First is the latest release from Canadian superstar **James Ehnes – Britten & Shostakovich Violin Concertos (Onyx 4113)** performed with the **Bournemouth Symphony Orchestra** under the direction of **Kirill Karabits**. Following on his 2013 JUNO award-winning Tchaikovsky recording with the Sydney Symphony and Vladimir Ashkenazy (Onyx 4076), Ehnes' performances are everything that we've come to expect. But what really caught me about this recording is the pairing of the Britten with Shostakovich's First. These two works, written ten years apart, bear remarkable similarities and as presented here the opening Nocturne of the Shostakovich seems to grow inherently out of the slow Passacaglia finale of the Britten. I'm surprised that these works are not more often presented together. As a matter of fact this seems to be the only recording currently available which includes them both. Malcolm MacDonald's booklet notes are thorough and enlightening. The orchestral sound is irreproachable and as mentioned above, Ehnes is in top form.

**Quatuor Molinari's** latest **ATMA** release (ACD2 2672) completes their cycle of the 12 (currently existing) **String Quartets of R. Murray Schafer**. Following their 2000 release of the first seven quartets and in 2003 the eighth quartet paired with *Theseus and Beauty and the Beast*, the current double CD includes new recordings of Quartets 9 to 12 and a re-issue of No.8. Since the recording of the first set the personnel of the quartet has changed substantially, with only founding first violinist Olga Ranzenhofer remaining. The current line-up includes Frédéric Bednorz, Frédéric Lambert and Pierre-Alain Bouvrette. They seem as comfortable and confident in this sometimes challenging, and oft' times playful, repertoire as their forerunners. I would be curious though to know whether Bouvrette will prove as adept at playing the cello while marching as his predecessor Julie Trudeau was in the Seventh Quartet when the Molinari performed a Schafer marathon at Glenn Gould Studio back in 2003.



When the Orford Quartet recorded the first cycle of Schafer string quartets, then numbering five, for the Centrediscs label in 1990, producer David Jaeger suggested that the individual works could be considered movements of one large piece, much the same way that Schafer's *Patria* series of music theatre works constitute a whole. There are many internal references from one quartet to the next and this has continued throughout the extended cycle.


Due in part to timing considerations within the medium of the compact disc I expect, the current set begins with the Ninth Quartet and continues chronologically through the Twelfth with the 2003 recording of the Eighth added as an appendix at the end of the second disc. This serves the double purpose of isolating the previously released material but also, since the Ninth begins by quoting a theme from the Eighth, of bringing the mini-cycle full circle to where the first disc began. Including the re-issue in this new set also

facilitates listening for those who want to experience all 12 quartets by including the first seven on one set (ACD2 2188/89) and the remaining five on this new collection. Kudos to the Molinari, past and present, for their documentation of and dedication to this outstanding and unique cycle from one of Canada's foremost composers. One of my summer projects will be to take up the challenge and listen to all 12 as one *über* quartet.

Our *WholeNote* reviews tend to focus on the best of the plethora of new releases we receive each month, but there are sometimes reasons for visiting or re-visiting older discs. One example of this is Jack MacQuarrie's review of a 2005 CD by flutist Christopher Lee later in these pages. It is a disc we missed when it was released and which came to MacQuarrie's attention at a recent live performance. Since Lee is a very active part of the Canadian Flute Convention in Oakville at the end of June it was decided to include a review in the current issue. Similarly, I had the exceptional experience of hearing the **Complete String Quartets of Iannis Xenakis** performed by the **JACK Quartet** during the recent Random Walks: Music of Xenakis and Beyond festival/symposium presented by the

Fields Institute at the University of Toronto and the Perimeter Institute in Waterloo. This music is definitely not for the faint of heart, with its density and abrasiveness, but when heard in the context of explanatory papers at the symposium and so stunningly performed by a group that has truly made these works their own, it was exhilarating. The program notes by James Harley were reprinted from the 2009 **Xenakis Edition Volume 10 (Mode 209)** compact disc and during a break I went in search of it. After checking Grigorian (they had several volumes of the series, but not the quartets) and HMV with no luck, I remembered that someone had mentioned an independent shop with quite an eclectic collection. I'd like to thank whoever that was, and Soundscapes (572 College St.) where the disc was indeed in stock. This was JACK's first appearance in Toronto (although it turns out that three of the members, all but the current violinist, did come here for a masterclass with Helmut Lachenmann presented by New Music Concerts back in 2003) and they certainly lived up to their reputation as one of the foremost contemporary ensembles in the world. I await their return with bated breath and in the interim will revisit their recording time and time again.

I will thank Bruce Surtees for my next foray into the archives. In his review of a new recording of **Schoenberg's *Verklärte Nacht*** by the Emerson String Quartet and friends, Bruce mentioned that Eduard Steuermann, a student of Schoenberg, had made a transcription of the fabled work for piano trio. This whetted my appetite as an amateur cellist who loves to play trios, quartets and quintets with friends, and I was very pleased to find several choices of recording available at Atelier Grigorian (70 Yorkville Ave.). I chose the 2005 **Vienna Piano Trio** version (**Dabringhaus und Grimm MDG 342 1354-2**) because I found the inclusion of Zemlinsky's *Piano Trio* and Mahler's piano quartet movement to be most appropriate. I am happy to say that I found Steuermann's adaptation for violin, cello and piano of Schoenberg's *String Sextet* very satisfying, in fact more so than I might have expected. Steuermann was a renowned pianist and his arrangement captures the density of the score without sacrificing any of the subtlety. The performance is convincing and the sound quality on the MDG "gold" disc is clear and robust. I've added having a hands-on go at this arrangement as another one of my summer aspirations.



## VOCAL

### Rameau – *Les Amants Trahis* Philippe Sly; Hélène Guilmette; Clavecin en Concert; Luc Beauséjour Analekta AN 2 9991

► Rameau was always

supremely confident of his instrumental compositions, yet opera remained his key challenge. His quest for excellence is demonstrated in this CD. In some short extracts from *Thétis*, bass-baritone Philippe Sly sings an attractive prélude “Muses, dans vos divins concerts,” demonstrating Rameau’s mastery of airs and *récitatifs*. More complex are the pieces selected from *Les Amants Trahis*: Hélène Guilmette and Sly are almost polyphonic in “Ma bergère a trahi sa foi,” carefully interpreting the moods of the duo. In fact, it is difficult to decide which are the more enjoyable, the duos or the airs—the compilers offer us no fewer than 30 tracks to help us make up our minds!



*Les Amants Trahis*, with 12 tracks selected, dominates this anthology, but let us not forget *Aquilon et Orithie*. The air “Servez mes feux à votre tour” features not only some spirited singing but also a vigorous violin accompaniment. *Le Berger Fidèle*’s “Faut-il qu’Amarillis périsse?” is an excellent vehicle for Guilmette’s skills, stately and pensive as is the air in question.

Finally, there is the conducting from the harpsichord by Luc Beauséjour, who brings out the best in his continuo. All demonstrate the importance of Rameau whether to opera or to French music.

### Mahler – *Orchesterlieder* Christian Gerhaher; Orchestre symphonique de Montréal; Kent Nagano Analekta AN 2 9849

► Kent Nagano’s initial collaboration with the splendid German baritone Christian Gerhaher and the OSM in a Sony recording of Mahler’s *Das Lied von der Erde* drew qualified admiration from me in 2009. This new recording of Mahler’s vocal works on the

Analekta label is a patchwork from two January evenings during the inaugural season of the OSM’s new concert hall in 2012. As before, the main attraction is Gerhaher’s exceptional voice and sensitive interpretation of the three major song cycles: the youthful *Lieder eines fahrenden Gesellen*, the ruminative *Kindertotenlieder*, and the variegated settings of the *Rückert Lieder*. (Gerhaher also released a sensational Deutsche Grammophon recording of *Des Knaben Wunderhorn* with Pierre Boulez and the Cleveland Orchestra in 2010.)



Nagano is an attentive collaborator and handles tempo fluctuations adroitly, though the dynamic contrasts and drama of the music are decidedly underplayed. The recorded sound has considerable presence which is both a blessing and a curse as this is one of the noisier live performance pick-ups I’ve heard. Beyond the usual muffled coughs from the audience, odd thumps and strange mutterings occasionally infest the stage as well. (This is the downside of making recordings on the cheap without the contribution of an engaged producer in proper studio conditions.) Gerhaher’s finely modulated voice and excellent diction set a new standard for future interpreters of Mahler lieder. Thankfully this time (unlike the OSM *Das Lied* release) full French and English translations of the German texts are provided.

### Kajia Saariaho – *La Passion de Simone* Dawn Upshaw; Finnish RSO; Tapiola Chamber Choir; Esa-Pekka Salonen Ondine ODE 1217-5

► There is no easy way to explain the mystery that was Simone Weil. A trained philosopher before women were seen as capable of comprehending philosophy, a secularized Jew who converted to Catholicism, a pacifist who sought combat in the Spanish Civil War, a left-wing thinker who put her ideas



to the test by joining a factory assembly line...Add to it a martyr in her death (or was she anorexic?), an altruist living an ascetic life and a major irritant to those who believe that upholding convention is the only way to maintain social order. It is a small wonder that the composer who embarked on writing an oratorio based on the life of this incredible woman is a rebel herself—Kajia Saariaho, known to Toronto audiences through her remarkable opera *Love from Afar*.

This oratorio, a small and reflective work, uses the martyr scenario of Stations of the Cross to depict Weil’s life. The music is not grand by any measure, as the life depicted was contemplative and largely introverted. This is served well by the voice of Dawn Upshaw, who sounds here as Weil might have—suffering and tired. Esa-Pekka Salonen skilfully coaxes the delicate harmonies out of the tightly wound melodies, bringing his understanding of nuance to the task. Weil herself said it best: “Two powers hold sway over the universe: light and gravity.” There is an abundance of both of them here.

### Rossini – *Il Barbiere di Siviglia* Cecilia Bartoli; David Kuebler; Gino Quilico; Carlos Feller; Schwetzingen SWR Festspiele; Gabriele Ferro ArtHaus Musik 102 305

► *Useless Precaution.*

Believe it or not, this was how this opera was called at its premiere. Since the *Barbiere* had already been written by the older, well-established Paisiello, Rossini had to choose a different title. Opening night the Teatro Argentina in Rome was filled with Paisiello fans and this new opera by a “young upstart” was booed and whistled off the stage, but now, almost 200 years later where is Paisiello?

This wonderful production from Cologne just proves how successful a performance can be without any directorial updating, added “relevance” or other nonsense that has ruined so many present day productions. Although traditional, it is brilliantly directed by veteran Michael Hampe, but it is the principal singers who make this production unforgettable. The star mezzo, Cecilia Bartoli, has distinguished herself as a true Rossini diva both as a dramatic actress (e.g. Desdemona) and here as a delightful comedienne singing with virtuosio brilliance and conquering Rossini’s hair-raising fioraturas with supreme ease. Underneath she has a mischievous trait and hidden fire par excellence so essential for a Rossini heroine.

Her counterpart as Count Almaviva, American tenor David Kuebler, wreaks havoc in some hilarious scenes (especially as a



drunken soldier), his voice perfectly suited for Rossini's difficult tessituras. No less successful is Canadian baritone Gino Quilico (Figaro) who proves to be a worthy son of his famous father, with a velvety, resilient and acrobatic lyrical baritone. A wonderful bonus in the basso department is the eminent, now regrettably late Robert Lloyd, incomparable as Don Basilio, but Carlos Feller certainly doesn't disappoint as the hilarious though pitiful Dr. Bartolo either.

## EARLY MUSIC & PERIOD PERFORMANCE

### Janitsch – Sonate da camera Volume 3 Notturna; Christopher Palameta ATMA ACD2 2626

▶ Johann Gottlieb Janitsch (1708–1763) was a court musician for Frederick the Great. As a composer, he embraced the contrapuntal style of the day in his intricate chamber music.



Here *Notturna*, under the leadership of oboist Christopher Palameta, performs five of his *quadro* sonatas.

The works are complex as the counterpoint weaves between the voices with challenging progressions. The ensemble performs with a clear balance between the instruments and a driving group rhythm. Each member of the ensemble is a “star” as the works demand a detailed focus on each note and a sense of the longer line. This is especially evident in *Quadro in B-Flat Major, Op.3, No.1*. In this world premiere recording, a rapid change in harmonies in the first five measures foreshadows a fascinating and technically difficult work that seems to embrace the composer's self-imposed challenge to expand his musical boundaries. In contrast, *Op.1, No.5 in C Major* is a slightly lighter work, and is the only quartet to use an obbligato cello. The opening dancelike *Larghetto alla Siciliana* is convincing with its deliberate pizzicato continuo articulation. The second movement *Fugue from Op.7, No.5 in C Minor* for oboe, violin, viola and continuo is an aural treat. At just over two minutes in duration, Palameta's oboe performance is especially colourful in its detail and ability to cement the parts together.

The balanced performances make this *Notturna* release one to be enjoyed time and time again.

### Couperin – Concerts Royaux Clavecin en Concert; Luc Beauséjour Analekta AN 2 9993

▶ Louis XIV summoned Couperin to play for him nearly every Sunday; the works performed in 1714–1715 were titled *Concerts*

*Royaux* and were published in 1722. Couperin left the instrumentation of the concerts to the musicians' discretion, a traditional Renaissance practice, even if the movements take the form of the traditional French baroque suite, no doubt under the Sun King's influence.



From the *First concert*, the flute, oboe and bassoon lend a different quality to what would otherwise have been strings-dominated pieces. The woodwind instruments are prominent in the *prélude* and *sarabande*, where they impart a melancholy quality, and in the *gavotte* and *gigue* where the result is a more rustic feel.

In the *Second concert*, the strings make themselves felt much more, notably in the gentle quality of the *air tendre*. The last movement, *échos*, restores the balance in favour of the woodwind, in a dignified baroque style.

The *Third and Fourth concerts royaux* combine some lively performances for oboe, bassoon and flute, most notably in the *Musette* of the *Third*. The name *Allemande* for the second movement of the *Third* belies its liveliness, even if *sarabande grave* is an entirely appropriate name for the fourth movement.

And then the *Fourth*, with yet another *Allemande* not living up to its sombre reputation. In fact, both the *Courantes* which immediately follow, and the *Rigaudon* and *forlane en rondeau* make this the most exuberant of the *concerts royaux*.

All in all, an enjoyable collection of Couperin's music for his royal master.

## CLASSICAL & BEYOND

### Haydn – Piano Concertos Nos. 3, 4 & 11 Marc-André Hamelin; Les Violons du Roy; Bernard Labadie Hyperion CDA67925

▶ This new offering from Hyperion features Haydn's three “indubitably genuine” concertos for keyboard and orchestra (HOB XVIII: 3, 4 and 11), and a delightful offering it is. Performed on modern piano, strings and winds rather than on their historical counterparts, the disc opens with the popular *D Major Concerto*, written for “harpsichord or fortepiano” sometime between 1779 and 1783. The latest and most dramatic of the three concertos, it makes a bold and energetic opening statement. The *F Major* and *G Major* concertos, originally written for harpsichord in the 1760s, are slightly less effusive works but in



these performances they sparkle with refined *galanterie*.

Hamelin's performance as the piano soloist is expressive, well considered and full of humour, tenderness or bravado as befits the musical moment at hand. His talent for paying infinite attention to detail without ever losing sight of the bigger musical picture is truly impressive, exceptionally so in the slow movements. As we'd expect from *Les Violons du Roy* under the baton of Bernard Labadie, the ensemble playing is detailed, focused and musical—lots of light when they are in the forefront, and fine shadowing of Hamelin when the limelight is his. The teamwork between orchestra and soloist is well balanced and amiable. And finally, my kudos to all for the beautiful distinctions made between the various *vivaces*, *allegros* and *prestos*!

### Mozart – Piano Concertos 17 & 27 Angela Hewitt; Orchestra da Camera di Mantova; Hannu Lintu Hyperion CDA67919

▶ There is a cute little story attached to Mozart's *G Major Concerto*. Apparently he acquired a little bird, a starling who quickly picked up the rondo theme of the third movement and sang it day in and day out, adding some of its own bits to it which pleased Mozart, a bird lover, immensely. No doubt, this helped him composing.



Canada's own stellar pianist, Angela Hewitt, chose this and the last, the *B-Flat Major Concerto* to follow-up on her previous Mozart concerto issue on the distinguished Hyperion label and what a fine recording this is. In coupling the *G Major*, which comes from a very happy and successful period of the composer's life with the *B-Flat Major*, his last statement in this form, Hewitt traverses a cross section of emotions, from joyful happiness to sad resignation and premonition of death.

My own experience with Hewitt's exceptional pianism began with Bach and later with immense enjoyment of her beautiful set of Chopin *Nocturnes* (that were probably easier to interpret), so she came to Mozart relatively late. It was worth the wait. She approaches Mozart like a scholar with exceptional intelligence and a thoroughly sympathetic heart. Her playing has graceful elegance, impeccable technical prowess; the emotional content is deeply felt and compositional structure is fully understood. The orchestra and the conductor Hannu Lintu are wonderfully compatible and in perfect balance with the angelic tones of the Hewitt's celebrated Fazioli piano. The recording is superlative.

## Chopin – Études

Jan Lisiecki

Deutsche Grammophon 4791039

▶ Young male pianists all too often try their audiences with a few years of brash playing where speed and volume overshadow their muse. Although impressed with divine keyboard technique, one nevertheless waits patiently for music to emerge—which it eventually and thankfully does.

More rarely, however, comes a young man for whom impeccable technique is merely a tool in the search for music's kernel of meaning. This is Jan Lisiecki.

Since his early public appearances five years ago (in his mid-teens) this young Polish-Canadian has somehow managed to avoid this testosterone trap. He is capable of the most ethereal pianissimos, a blazing and accurate technique and breathtaking power at the keyboard.

The two dozen *Études* of Chopin's *Op.10* and 25 seem the perfect repertoire for Lisiecki at this point in his career. His playing shifts convincingly from transparent lightness to earnest melancholy. His tempi and dynamics feel more understood than learned. His own comments in the CD notes reveal a young mind with a remarkably mature interpretive grasp of Chopin's music. He thinks with his heart.

As impressive as his playing is his recording technique in which each of the *Études* was recorded as a complete "take." Technology today offers performers digital perfection with undetectable manipulations of speed and other values, but Lisiecki wanted his audience to have the real thing, start to finish. He allowed no edits. This speaks to a commendable honesty in performance. We should anticipate many years of truly extraordinary recordings from this young man. But we might also hope that his gift finds expression in teaching...we need such mentors.


## L'Opera Concertante

(Opera transcriptions by Ernest Alder)

Trio Hochelaga

ATMA ACD2 2652

▶ Transcribing arias from the popular operas of the time was one of the favourite practices of 19th-century composers. Those transcriptions ranged from faithful reductions to variations, fantasies and potpourris, and were usually done for one or two pianos, trios and quartets. The public enjoyed the more intimate, chamber setting of these



transcriptions and took pleasure in the idea of bringing the opera into their salons.

Richard Ernest Alder (1853–1904) was a Swiss composer who studied at the Paris Conservatory and spent most of his life in France. He wrote a number of pieces for piano, as well as choral and orchestral works. He is being rediscovered today as a transcriber and arranger.

This CD features seven of Alder's trio transcriptions of the beloved operas by Camille Saint-Saëns (*Samson et Dalila*), Ambroise Thomas (*Mignon*), Daniel-François-Esprit Auber (*La Muette de Portici*), Giacomo Meyerbeer (*La Pardon de Ploërmel* and *Les Huguenots*) and Jules Massenet (*Le Cid* and *Werther*). The transcriptions are skilfully done and adopt the same formula consisting of a brief introduction, followed by alternating sequences of fast and slow segments ending in a dramatic climax. Even though the composers are different, the music feels like one cohesive piece. Alder brings out both the sweetness and the drama in these transcriptions, combining virtuosic practices of 19th-century writing with more serene and sonorous parts, while using the craftsmanship firmly rooted in the German Romantic tradition.

Trio Hochelaga (Anne Robert, violin; Paul Marleyn, cello; Stéphane Lemelin, piano) is a distinguished Canadian ensemble whose repertoire places an emphasis on lesser known works of French music. Their interpretation of Alder's transcriptions is playful, sensitive and polished. The ensemble's use of colours and textures truly captures the romantic essence of these operas.

It is not necessary for the listener to know the operas that inspired Alder—one can just enjoy the wonderful chamber music on this CD and, like the 19th-century audience, be entertained by it.

## My Lucky Life



▶ In recordings of flute music, more often than not the focus is on the technical skills of the performer. Toronto flutist Christopher Lee has no need to concentrate on such a display; it is evident in all of his work. This CD shines a different light. With a few exceptions, for this recording Lee has selected well-known arias from operas. I was immediately attracted to this CD because it contains a flute and harp rendition of my all-time favourite operatic aria, "Mon coeur s'ouvre a ta voix," from Saint-Saëns' opera *Samson et Dalila*. In the opera *Dalila* seduces Samson so that he may be captured. All of the emotion



of this work is brought to us though the warm and full-bodied tone of the artist's flute enhanced by the beautiful counterpoint of the harp (Jacqueline Goring). Throughout the many rubato passages these two are in perfect synchronism as if they were reading each other's emotions. While the violin (Alexa Wilks) plays a lesser role on this CD, it fulfills a significant role in the fabric of the arrangements.

Much of the recording contains similar renditions of familiar arias from the operas of Verdi, Puccini and Weber. The balance contains incidental music for plays by Grieg and Nielsen as well as the familiar serenade "Ständchen" from Schubert's song cycle *Schwanengesang*. The disc leads off with Godard's "Berceuse" from his opera *Jocelyn*. This is one of those enduring melodies which has stood the test of time long after the opera and composer have been forgotten.

With the exception of the work by Nielsen all of the arrangements were crafted by Lee. The program notes on the music and the performers are concise and informative.

## D'Indy – Symphonie sur un Chant

montagnard français; Saugefleurie; Medée

Louis Lortie; Iceland Symphony Orchestra;



▶ At the time of writing, spring has finally arrived, so a disc which includes Vincent d'Indy's *Symphonie sur un Chant montagnard français* seems particularly appropriate in celebration of the season. The disc in question is the fifth volume in a series on the Chandos label presenting music by the Parisian-born composer performed by the Iceland Symphony under the direction of Rumon Gamba.

Born in 1851, d'Indy was a controversial figure during his lifetime, his strong right-wing political views frequently going against the mainstream. Nevertheless, he was regarded as a composer of considerable stature, and his eclectic and romantic style exerted considerable influence on later composers, such as Eric Satie and Albert Roussel.

In addition to the *Symphonie*, with renowned pianist Louis Lortie as the soloist, the disc also features *Saugefleurie*, *Medée*, and the *Prélude to Act One* of his opera *Fervaal*. The *Symphonie* is surely one of d'Indy's most famous compositions, and is treated here with the joyous spirit it deserves. Based on a folk song from Tourtous, the



work is a large and lush canvas with Lortie forming a perfect musical partnership with the orchestra. *Saugefleurie* had its origins in a poem by Robert de Bonnières and here the prominent use of horns and chromatic harmonies shows the clear influence of Wagner. (Unlike many of his French contemporaries, d'Indy was a staunch Wagnerite). Also with a literary connotation is the orchestral suite *Medée*, written for a tragedy by Catulle Mendès. The Iceland Symphony performs with a sensitive assurance, ably capturing the orchestral colours and contrasting moods in this story of doomed love, thus rounding out a most satisfying recording.

This is a fine addition in the series devoted to the "Samson of music," one which is helping bring to light certain works that up to now have unjustly languished in obscurity. D'Indy would be gratified!

**Journeys: Tchaikovsky – Souvenir de Florence; Schoenberg – Verklärte Nacht Emerson String Quartet; Paul Neubauer; Colin Carr  
Sony 887254 70602**

▶ Firstly, I must admit my prejudice against the Emerson String Quartet was initiated by a keen disappointment and lingering dislike of their Beethoven *String Quartets* cycle of the mid-1990s issued by DG. To my ears, those coldly efficient, shiny performances displayed no empathy at all for the human being behind the scores. So it was with some trepidation that I approached this new CD, recorded just last year, but the interpretations are exemplary!



*Verklärte Nacht* is a particular favourite of mine, both in the original sextet version of 1899 and the opulent version for string orchestra revised in 1943. There is also a version for piano trio by Eduard Steuermann, a pupil of Schoenberg, of which several performances are available. The Emersons are right on the mark here. Their towering performance is completely focused with impeccable ensemble. Sensitive to every nuance and reading between the notes, the group appears to be totally absorbed by the beauty of the score and, just maybe, mindful of the melodrama and imagery of the Richard Dehmel poem that inspired it. Arguably, this performance sweeps the board.

*Souvenir de Florence* is an exhilarating, less familiar four-movement sextet by Tchaikovsky. It enjoys the same attention from the players who turn in a solid and joyous performance of this beautifully decorated score that will surely convert new listeners into fans of this captivating, abundantly energetic opus.

The recording producer and engineer,

Da-Hong Seetoo, deserves an award for achieving such stunning realism and immediacy with apparent ease. This is an inspired disc that belongs on your shelf.

**Mahler – Symphony No.1 London Philharmonic Orchestra; Vladimir Jurowski  
LPO LPO-00070**

▶ The late release of a 2010 performance of Mahler's *Symphony No.1* on the London Philharmonic's house label reveals a young conductor, Vladimir Jurowski, leading an enthusiastic and quite capable orchestra in repertoire he evidently has not quite come to terms with. This is most evident in the first movement, where Jurowski's rigid phrasing robs the music of much of its charm and freshness. The novelty of this particular performance is the inclusion of a fifth movement titled "Blumine" (Flowers) inserted between the first and



second movements, an addition which was deleted by Mahler after three performances and was presumed lost until it resurfaced in 1966. Over 20 recordings have included this movement since then, but considering the flood of recordings we have experienced lately it's still quite a rarity. Jurowski's freakishly muscular interpretation of this delicate movement is certainly no bed of flowers, and for my taste the plebeian lack of perfume spoils the contrast with the country bumpkin charm of the following Scherzo, which seems to pass by in a flash in its wake. Having opted to reclaim the past by the inclusion of the extra movement, Jurowski inexplicably gives in to current revisionism by assigning the celebrated double bass solo that launches the ensuing bizarre funeral march to the entire section according to the specious reasoning of the latest Mahler edition. Thankfully by this point the conductor is beginning to show some real enthusiasm, finally hitting his stride in the hyper-theatrical grand finale and eventually saving the day with a fiery conclusion. The recorded sound from the recently renovated Royal Festival Hall is quite acceptable with no discernible distractions.

# Strings Attached

ALTHOUGH SHE doesn't really do any more than her collaborators on her latest CD featuring Schubert's *String Quintet* and Schoenberg's *Verklärte Nacht*, the terrific **Janine Jansen** gets virtually solo credit and attention on the cover (Decca 478 3551). Her usual musical intelligence and sensitivity, however, is clearly matched by violinist **Boris Brovtsyn**, violists **Maxim Rysanov** and **Amihai Grosz**, and cellists **Torleif Thedéen** and **Jens Peter Maintz**. Schoenberg arranged *Verklärte Nacht* for string orchestra, but what a ravishing and entrancing work it is in this original sextet form. Written in 1899, well before his journey into atonality, it remains a stunningly beautiful late-Romantic work, given an exemplary performance here. The quality is just as high in the Schubert *String Quintet*, with impeccable balance between the voices revealing the intricate inner details with perfect clarity, and far more successfully than most ensembles. Attention to detail, never for its own sake but always with the aim of enriching the interpretation, is one of Jansen's great strengths, and her leadership here is evident. This is music-making of the highest quality, and as engrossing and satisfying a performance



of this wonderful work as you could wish for.

Another of Decca's young European superstar violinists, **Julia Fischer**, has a new CD of the **Bruch and Dvořák Violin Concertos**, with **David Zinman** leading the **Tonhalle-Orchester Zürich** (Decca 478 3544). In the old LP days,

the Bruch *Violin Concerto in G Minor* was nearly always paired with the Mendelssohn, but the Dvořák makes a surprisingly good companion. The two works were written only about 12 years apart, and share similarities in form—as indeed they do with the Mendelssohn. Fischer clearly has a great affection and affinity for the

Dvořák: her mother is Czech and studied in Prague, and the concerto was one of the first that Fischer studied as a child. It's a lovely work that has never really established itself at the top of the standard repertoire. Fischer believes that this is changing; it would certainly be difficult to find a more convincing argument than the one she presents here. From the very strong opening, through the beautiful slow movement to the lively finale, this is a magnificent performance—intense, expansive, rich and warm throughout, with a lustrous tone and lovely orchestral support.

Exactly the same can be said for the beautiful performance of the Bruch, which makes this old favourite sound new and fresh.

**Hyperion's** excellent ongoing series *The Romantic Violin Concerto* has reached Volume 14 with works by Alexander **Glazunov** and Othmar **Schoeck** (CDA67940); **Chloë Hanslip** is the soloist, with the **Orchestra della Svizzera Italiana** under **Alexander Vedernikov**. A beautiful performance of the Glazunov *A Minor Concerto* reminds us what a truly lovely work this is, and the short *Meditation Op.32* is no less lovely despite its brevity. The *Mazurka-oberek* dates from 1917, when Glazunov's work as head of the Conservatory in St. Petersburg left him with little time for composition; its Polish flavour suggests that it may have been one of the small number of works written with wartime patriotic associations. The Swiss composer Schoeck is known primarily for his vocal works, and his *Concerto quasi una fantasia in B-Flat Major, Op.21* is one of the few orchestral works that he produced. Written in his early 20s, it is a work that is an appropriate and welcome addition to this *Romantic* series.

Another outstanding ongoing series is **The Soviet Experience: String Quartets by Dmitri Shostakovich and his Contemporaries**, which reaches **Volume III** with a 2-CD set of Shostakovich quartets Nos.9 through 12 paired with Mieczyslaw Weinberg's *String Quartet No.6 in E Minor* (Cedille CDR 90000 138). The Polish-born Weinberg was a close friend of Shostakovich, and both composers influenced each other in their quartet writing. Weinberg's quartet, one of a series of 17, was written in 1946 but never performed; it was briefly included on the list of "non-recommended" works produced in 1948 as part of Andrei Zhdanov's anti-formalist campaign. Not published until 1979, it was apparently premiered as late as 2007.

The **Pacifica Quartet** is once again in simply superb form, playing these intensely personal works with sensitivity and passion and a wonderfully expressive range of dynamics.

## MODERN & CONTEMPORARY

### Ann Southam 5 Eve Egoyan Centrediscs CMCCD 19113

► There are many reasons to get excited about this recording of late works by maverick Canadian composer Ann Southam. For one thing, no one knew these works existed until they turned up in Southam's Toronto home after her death in 2010. For another, this is a gorgeous recording.



What struck me the first time I listened—and after many listenings I'm still not ready to put this disc away—was that although these works are strikingly austere, they throb with vitality. Like the water-sculpted fallen trees on the booklet cover, they enchant by stealth, as though they are emerging from another world.

Southam wrote these works with Toronto pianist Eve Egoyan in mind, like the works on Egoyan's two previous Southam recordings. Egoyan is able to bring special insights from those close collaborations with Southam to her exquisite handling of the lilting, halting and shifting rhythmic patterns which connect these works to each other, and to previous works called *Returnings* (two of these share the name *Returnings*, while the rest were left untitled).


The booklet throws light on Southam's personal sound-world, especially by reproducing pages from her manuscripts. The sound is clear and spacious, allowing the pauses to resonate. But this disc deserves a more meaningful title, especially since it makes such an important addition to the already substantial evidence that Southam is not just one of our finest composers—hers is a significant voice in contemporary music.

### T. Patrick Carrabrè – War of Angels Winnipeg Symphony Orchestra Centrediscs CMCCD 18513

► T. Patrick Carrabrè's accessible, modernist music is characterized by angular lines and apt, dissonant sonorities orchestrated with clarity and balance. *Inuit Games* (2002) is an engrossing work in which Inuit throat singers Pauline Pemik and Inukshuk




Aksalnik together weave continuous vocal patterns. Around them Carrabrè emphasizes the low and high orchestra registers in mysterious, menacing sonorities. A unique and strong piece. In *Symphony No.1: The War of Angels* (1996), the opening movement's fast triplet motion initially struck me as suggesting a finale. But then, shouldn't wars happen differently in angel space and time? The sombre slow movement has profound moments, while the concluding one needs more intensity, in my view. The Winnipeg Symphony brass and winds shine in this work.

Hearing the workmanlike first movement of *Symphony No.3* (2003) left me with some qualms about the composer's propensity for the *moto perpetuo* process. But the second one is richer and more expansive; the Winnipeg winds give their numerous atmospheric solos loving treatment. And the finale is dramatic and varied, with some intricate counterpoint that builds to an impressive climax. *The Dragon's Tail* (1997) is the exciting closer on this disc, featuring percussion passages performed energetically as the other sections of the orchestra also generate plenty of menace! Kudos to Carrabrè for his compositions and his work (along with conductors Andrey Boreyko and Bramwell Tovey) for the annual Winnipeg New Music Festival, which has helped composers, orchestra and audiences for contemporary music flourish.

### Rite Jon Kimura Parker Independent FP 0907 jonkimuraparker.com

► *Rite* is an exciting CD of world premiere transcriptions of Stravinsky's *The Rite of Spring* (1913) and the complete ballet *Petrouchka* (1911) by pianist extraordinaire Jon Kimura Parker.



There have been numerous transcriptions of the *Rite*, notably, by Stravinsky himself, Sam Raphling and Dickran Atamian. There are countless CDs and YouTube versions of three movements from the ballet *Petrouchka*. Emil Gilels, Grigory Sokolov, Alexis Weissenberg, Maurizio Pollini are excellent, Yuja Wang and Lang Lang with huge followings less so. What makes Parker's version of *Petrouchka* a "must listen" is his remarkable and sensitive adaption of the complete ballet for solo piano. The focus is not so much on the pianistic fireworks of the famous dances but more on the pathos and lyrical qualities of melodic passages and the storyline. His attention to detail in transcribing is impeccable and his performance is never rushed but unfolds with singing lines and capricious humour. The ballet breathes in shapes and emotions. I realized at the end of the piece that I had not

thought about the orchestra or the dancers because Parker's transcription works beautifully as an extraordinary solo piano piece. This is definitely a welcome addition to the piano repertoire.

May 29, 2013, is the 100th anniversary of *The Rite of Spring* premiere performance in Paris, France. Today *The Rite of Spring* is one of the most influential works of the 20th century. Claude Debussy knew the work well and played it with Stravinsky in the four-hand duet version. Stravinsky himself worked on the score from the piano so it is no surprise that it works well as a solo piano piece. Jon Kimura Parker discovered Stravinsky's piano duet version, which was used for ballet rehearsals. He felt that it was "less fastidious with details than I had expected." Parker then began to add instrumental lines that had been left out. Other solo piano versions were deemed either too minimal or unplayable. I like Parker's version with the encompassing layers of sound, from extreme delicacy and poignant colour to raw sensuality and primitive power. His performance is virtuosic both technically and artistically. I also agree with Parker's quote about his own inspiration for this project. "Playing *The Rite of Spring* at the piano I am reminded of the day that I saw an exhibition of Picasso's pencil sketches side by side with the finished paintings. Despite the absence of colour the angular power of the lines had even a greater impact." We can use the same words about this CD which is excellent and I recommend it highly.

**Ives/Brant – A Concord Symphony;**  
**Copland – Organ Symphony**  
**San Francisco Symphony;**  
**Michael Tilson Thomas**

▶ The four movements of Charles Ives's *Concord Sonata* for piano (published in 1919 at Ives's own expense along with his philosophical *Essays Before A Sonata*) are titled "Emerson," "Hawthorne," "The Alcotts" and "Thoreau"—all leading authors of the American Transcendentalist school. Ives' visionary writing is similarly "transcendent" and extremely challenging for performer and listener alike. Canadian-born composer, teacher and professional orchestrator Henry Brant had a particular affection for this groundbreaking work and set out to transcribe it for orchestra, a labour of love that occupied him off and on over the course of 35 years. The resulting 50-minute work was completed in 1994. Brant explained his intent was "to create a symphonic idiom which would ride in the orchestra with athletic sure-footedness and present Ives's music in clear, vivid and intense sonorities." Brant's transcription is masterful and highly imaginative.




He freely shifts the contours of melodic lines from one register to another and occasionally constructs inner voices to enhance his orchestral palette while remaining true to the content of Ives's original piano score which, with its multiple staves, extreme density and general absence of time signatures, clearly suggests a blueprint in the form of an orchestral short score. The result could hardly be in more capable hands than those of Michael Tilson Thomas and the San Francisco Symphony, both of whom have an outstanding record of support for contemporary American music.

The disc also includes Aaron Copland's *Organ Symphony* of 1925, a work commissioned and first performed by his mentor Nadia Boulanger. It is a remarkably assured accomplishment by the then 24-year-old composer and was the first of his works to receive wide public acclaim. Organist Paul Jacobs delivers a knockout performance of this intriguing and surprisingly intimate work. Superlative SACD quality sound throughout makes this disc a must-have item.

**Cage – Sonatas and Interludes for prepared piano**  
**Henry Kucharzyk**  
**Artifact Music ART-041**

▶ What to say about John Cage's *Sonatas and Interludes* for prepared piano? The piece has been recorded scores of times. Cage "invented" the prepared piano by inserting bolts, screws, pieces of rubber and other objects between the piano's strings at precise points along the strings' lengths in order to change the instrument's timbre and tuning in unexpected ways. He described the result as a percussion ensemble under the hands of a single player. Cage's insight and ingenuity in creating the prepared piano are a legendary moment in 20th century music. He had been exploring the possibilities of the prepared piano for some years up until the date of *Sonatas and Interludes* (1946–48) and continued to write for it for some years afterward. The prepared piano is the signature instrument of this early-to-middle phase of the composer's career.



What do we listen for in each new interpretation of the *Sonatas and Interludes*? Often, we tend to listen to the surface of this music—the novel sounds that result from Cage's preparations. But Henry Kucharzyk's performance takes us deeper into a new world of sound possibilities to approach the music's essential motives. Cage's "subject" was the nine "permanent" emotions of the Hindu tradition: the heroic, the erotic, the wondrous, the mirthful, sorrow, fear, anger, the odious and tranquility, to which the

others all tend and aspire. Cage does not specify whether a particular sonata or interlude was intended to depict one or more of these nine. The overall effect of this very beautiful CD suggests that Kucharzyk was especially highlighting tranquility, without short-changing any of the others. The erotic and the wondrous would be my next choices as guidelines/impulses in Kucharzyk's interpretation, which has its mirthful and sorrowful moments, too.

I don't remember now why I wasn't there to hear this performance at the Premiere Dance Theatre 23 years ago. It must have been wondrous indeed. But we have this unique recording thanks to Artifact Music, Arraymusic, recording technicians John Oswald and Christopher Butterfield and, most of all, to Henry Kucharzyk for his deeply intelligent and elegantly realized rendition—emotional in just the way Cage intended.

**Rota – Clarinet Sonata; Clarinet Trio**  
**Goran Gojevic; Mary Kenedi; Lynn Kuo;**  
**Winona Zelenka; Michael Sweeney**

▶ The name Nino Rota may not be all that familiar, but if you've ever seen *The Godfather* or heard the famous love theme from the 1968 film *Romeo and Juliet*, you've heard his music.



Born in Milan, Rota studied composition with Pizzetti and later at the Curtis Institute in Philadelphia. Although he is chiefly known today for his film scores, his output also includes a large number of chamber and orchestral works, all of it written in a contemporary but thoroughly accessible style. And what better way to sample some of his non-commercial output than through this fine Naxos recording with music performed by some of Toronto's top musicians? Among the pieces presented here are the *Clarinet Sonata*, the *Clarinet Trio*, *Improviso*, *Toccata for Bassoon and Piano* and the *Fantasia for Piano*, admirably performed by Goran Gojevic, clarinet, Mary Kenedi, piano, Lynn Kuo, violin, Winona Zelenka, cello, and Michael Sweeney, bassoon.

This is a charming disc, its appeal not only in the high level of performance, but in the inherent contrasts found within the music. The *Trio for Clarinet, Cello and Piano* from 1973 is pure cheekiness, with two playful outer movements surrounding a languorous andante. In contrast, the lyrical *Clarinet Sonata*, written 18 years earlier, clearly looks back to the 19th century with its expansive melodies and mood of introspection. Gojevic's warm tone and Kenedi's solid command of the score result in a fine performance. Equally romantic is the *Fantasia for Piano*, also from 1945. A recent discovery, this piece seems

to draw from numerous sources, but few of them from the 20th century—do I detect a snippet of Schubert at times? A touch of French impressionism?

This collection is a most welcome addition to the catalogue, and ample proof that there is much more to Nino Rota than what we've heard on the big screen during the last 45 years. Bravo to all performers involved for some fine music making.

**Elżbieta Sikora – Solo and Electronics**  
**Various Artists**

▶ The soundworlds of the four works composed by Polish born Elżbieta Sikora emerge in this album out of the inspiration generated by the poetry of Zbigniew Herbert. Through the skilful interweaving of instrumental and electroacoustic timbres, each piece is an evocative sonic image stimulated by Herbert's words: a striding Orpheus-Apollo; a hesitant Nike beckoning; a waking dream shimmering; a collection of stones distilling midair.



Although celebrated in Europe, Sikora is relatively unknown in this country, but if you love listening to new sounds and are intrigued and curious about the electroacoustic genre, this CD offers music of breathtaking imagination and compelling sonic textures. Each piece presents an interaction between a solo instrument—flute, cello, harpsichord, piano—and electronic sources generated within a studio environment.

This interaction takes varying forms: question and answer, expression of opposite polarities, or one sonic plane enhanced by the other. And within each of the pieces, she has carefully crafted various approaches to creating a sense of open flexibility within the realm of a fixed time frame—always a compositional challenge with electroacoustic works for live players and pre-recorded electronics.

Even though the pieces were created over a period of 25 years, at no time do you feel as if the older technologies used are a limitation. In fact, quite the opposite. Each piece offers a window into a rich and diverse sonic language, and is full of dramatic vigour and intensity. Definitely a composer worth discovering.

**Night**  
**Holly Cole**

▶ Singer Holly Cole continues her stylish ways with her latest release. Her first studio

album in five years, *Night* is a return to collaboration with the bandmates of the last two decades that helped establish her as the fine song interpreter she is. So pianist and arranger, Aaron Davis, David Piltch on bass, sax and reed player John Johnson and drummer Davide Direnzo are the core players and provide clever nuanced support throughout. The theme of the album isn't obviously represented by the song titles as not an "evening" or "night" song is to be found. But there's a wee-small-hours-of-the-morning feel that permeates throughout.



The opening tune sets the tone as the group eases through a languid *You Only Live Twice* with dreamy pedal steel courtesy of Greg Leisz. Then we're led through a range of stories courtesy of some well-known songwriters like Tom Waits (the swampy *Walk Away*) and others a little more obscure but no less poignant, like Danny O'Keefe (*Good Time Charlie's Got the Blues*). Even when the energy gets kicked up, as it does on *Viva Las Vegas*—complete with 60s style horns and a smokin' flute solo from John Johnson—there's an appealing coolness that pervades. Cole and her band's tune-picking abilities and powers of interpretation are in abundance on *Night* and fans will not be disappointed.



**Kyle Benders Quartet**

▶ Proficient in both improvised and notated music, clarinetist/saxophonist Kyle Benders has become a known commodity on the local music scene and this bang-up disc aptly demonstrates his elevated compositional

and playing standards. Working through a program of eight somewhat bouncy always quirky Benders' originals he's helped immeasurably by the cohesive, multi-faceted soloing of trombonist Steve Ward, Tomas Bouda's unobtrusive yet sturdy bass line and the ever-inventive drumming of Mark Segger.



Working with motifs which reference brassy marching band music while utilizing extended instrumental techniques, the result is sophisticated without ever becoming esoteric. Segger and Ward are keys to this strategy. On a tune such as *Porlock* for instance, the trombonist constructs a jolting solo out of mid-range plunger impulses and smooth capillary extensions as Benders' soprano saxophone exposes quivering multiphonics. Meanwhile the theme is repeated at intervals with tremolo flutters from both, centred by the bassist. With *Whisk* it's blustering puffs and slurs from the 'bone man that hold the line as the composer on bass clarinet cascades split tones a cappella from subterranean to altissimo and is then joined by the drummer's ruffs and rebounds for a stop-time ending. *Terrace*, on the other hand, is Segger's showcase, as metallic clinks, castanet-like snaps and wood-block smacks move upfront. At the same time his pops and pitter-patters underline the theme, which correspondingly vibrates by parallel clarinet and trombone lines.

Far along in his synthesis of other influences, which include composer Anthony Braxton's eclecticism, the sax-and-trombone-centred New York Art Quartet and a crafty subversion of Cool Jazz's thin and subtle harmonies with raucous trombone blats and contrapuntal saxophone glossolalia, Benders is a noteworthy Toronto talent, with this CD a definitive showcase of his varied skills.

# jAZZ,eh?

**M**ONTREAL PIANIST **Oliver Jones** announced his retirement at age 65 back in 2000, but returned to performing shortly thereafter. Since then he's made a further contribution to the swing quotient of Canadian jazz, for Jones has a devotion



to rhythmic propulsion second only to Oscar Peterson. A certain resemblance may be inevitable: Jones grew up in the same Little Burgundy neighbourhood of Montreal where he studied piano with OP's sister, Daisy Peterson Sweeney. Josée Aidans appears as

a special guest with Jones' trio on about half of **Just for My Lady (Justin Time JUST 251-2 justin-time.com)** and the warmth of her violin adds a special touch, whether it's to the forceful *Josée's Blues*, the luminous balladry of *Lights of Burgundy* (a Jones composition from 1985) or the delightful swing of *Lady Be Good*. Elsewhere Jones, bassist Eric Lagace and drummer Jim Doxas are at their usual consummate level, consistently elegant whether reflective or joyous.

**Bill King** is another veteran pianist with a Peterson connection, first coming to Canada as a teenager in the 1960s to study at the Advanced School of Contemporary Music in Toronto. King has had a long career in Toronto as composer, publisher, bandleader and mentor to a host of vocalists, but on **Cinemascope: Orchestrations for Piano (Slaight Music slaightmusic.com)** he goes it alone at the keyboard of a Steinway grand, improvising on themes with cinematic inferences. There's a strong thread of Ellington's particular impressionism here, whether King is reflecting on Audrey Hepburn in *Audrey in Silk* or Duke's writing partner in *Strayhorn*. King's darkened-theatre reveries can recall a host of landscapes and genres, but they all seem to glow with the special luminosity of memory.

Another alumnus of the Peterson school is drummer **Don Vickery**, who was already active in Halifax jazz circles before he relocated to Toronto in 1959. Vickery is 74 now, but he's lost none of his springy, propulsive beat, amply demonstrated on his first CD as leader, **Alone Together (Cornerstone CRST CD 139 cornerstonerecordsinc.com)**. The music here is mainstream modern jazz of the first rank, with Vickery fitting hand-in-glove with his partners. Pianist Mark Eisenman's relaxed rhythmic phrasing and feel for the blues always suggest something of the late Wynton Kelly, while Neil Swainson is a genuine melodic bassist, whether soloing or playing the melody on Johnny Mandel's seldom heard *Close Enough for Love*. There's never a sense of a superfluous note here, and it all seems to float on air, wafted aloft on Vickery's detailed punctuation. Other highlights include Hampton Hawes' *Blues the Most* and Henry Mancini's *Dreamsville*, also imaginative repertoire choices.

The **Carn Davidson Nine (Addo AJR014 addorecords.com)** debuts a mid-size ensemble led by Toronto alto saxophonist Tara Davidson and trombonist William Carn. The band is a fine outlet for the co-leaders' compositions and arrangements, allowing for voicings and dynamics that are unavailable in the typical quintet or quartet. While the name may recall Phil Nimmons' groundbreaking nonet, this Nine's structure includes

sheer heft (consider the brassy force of Davidson's opening *Battle Scars*) as well as nuance, complementing the leaders with saxophonists Kelly Jefferson on tenor and Perry White on baritone (always forceful presences), trumpeters Jason Logue and Kevin Turcotte, and bass trombonist Terry Promane, with bassist Andrew Downing and drummer Fabio Ragnelli. The subtlety comes via the doubling, with flutes and flugelhorn coming to the fore on Carn's airy *When You Least Expect It*. With arrangers including Promane, Logue and Reg Schwager and high-level soloists (Davidson is delightfully abstract on her *South Western View*), the Carn Davidson Nine could become a significant institution.

Last year Montreal saxophonist Patrick Lampron released *Walking the Line* and Ottawa trumpeter Craig Pedersen put out *Days like These*, both CDs of exceptional promise.

That promise has been fulfilled in record time with the release of **Live in Silence (craigpedersen.com)**, the end product of a Northern




Quebec tour by **Pedersen/Lampron/Gobeil/Kerr/Thibodeau**, essentially Pedersen with the band from Lampron's CD: guitarist, Dominic Gobeil, bassist Joel Kerr and drummer Eric Thibodeau. While Pedersen's band conception usually falls in the overlapping orbits of Ornette Coleman and John Zorn's Masada, here the collective inspirations are the ECM label's Nordic cool, open harmonies and spacious, lyrical modal jazz, complemented by influences from Wayne Shorter and Tomasz Stanko. The band is cohesive, with Pedersen bringing another dimension, nowhere more apparent than

in Lampron's compelling and concluding *Obrigada*, a composition that the quintet sustains with developing interest for nearly 17 minutes of music.

A similar Ontario/Quebec connection appears in the quintet of free improvisers **Martin, Lozano, Lewis, Wiens, Duncan** on the CD **at Canterbury (Barnyard Records BR0332 barnyardrecords.com)**. The style is deliberate and focused, with ideas clearly developing as they're passed around the group. Singer Christine Duncan and guitarist Rainer Wiens, doubling on theremin and mbira respectively, can create backgrounds of a rain forest density while trumpeter Jim Lewis and saxophonist Frank Lozano are deft musical architects, marking lyrical trails through the soundscape, all of it enhanced by Martin's expansive store of adroitly distributed sounds.

There's an often uncanny sense of form here, and it's too bad that Wiens and Lozano reside 500 kilometres from the rest of the band.

Montreal saxophonist **François Carrier** and drummer **Michel Lambert** are regular ambassadors to the world of improvised music, intrepid travellers who have matched inspirations with similarly open creators throughout Europe and parts of Asia. On **Overground to the Vortex (Not Two MW904-2 nottwo.com)**, another segment in their extended chronicle, the two appear at London's Vortex with two outstanding representatives of the British school of free improvisation, bassist John Edwards and pianist Steve Beresford. The trio of Carrier, Lambert and Edwards are heard first with Edwards' complex bass activity matching up perfectly with Lambert, creating a force field of percolating rhythmic details that Carrier negotiates with the zeal of an urban explorer facing a new metropolis. The full quartet assembles for *Archway*, an extended musical arc consisting of constantly shifting moods and densities, highlighted by Carrier's controlled passion and Beresford's playfulness. ●



## Something in the Air Modern Rhythms and New Jazz

AS THE RHYTHMIC base of jazz has changed over the past half century, adding emphases besides pure swing to improvisation, the role of the percussionist has changed as well. No longer just a time keeper the modern drummer must be conversant with varied beats



from many genres of music. This familiarity with other cultures is also why many non-Americans have become prominent. Case in point is Norwegian percussionist **Paal Nilssen-Love**, who plays with the Euro-American band **Lean Left** at the Tranzac

on June 15. Nilssen-Love, whose associates range from the most committed electronics dial-twister to free-form veterans is equally proficient laying down a hard rock-like beat as he is trading accents with experimental timbre-shatters.

The two extended tracks on **Live at Café Oto (Unsounds 32U unsounds.com)** demonstrate not only Nilssen-Love's cohesive skills amplifying the improvisations of Chicago-based tenor saxophonist/clarinetist Ken Vandermark as he does in many other contexts, but shows how both react to the power chords and violent string distortions which characterize the style of guitarists Andy Moor and Terrie Ex from Dutch punk band The Ex, who complete this quartet. In spite of Vandermark's consistent overblowing which encompasses pumping altissimo honks and frenetic slurs, plus the guitarists' constant crunches, smashes and frails, the drumming never degenerates into monotonous



rock music-like banging. Instead, while the backbeat isn't neglected, auxiliary clips, ruffs, ratamacues and smacks are used by Nilssen-Love to break up the rhythm, with carefully measured pulsations. This strategy is most obvious during the climatic sections of the more-than-37-minute *Drevel*. With all four Lean Lefters improvising in broken octaves, the narrative shakes to and fro between Vandermark's collection of emphasized freak notes and dyspeptic stridency and the dual guitarists' slurred fingering that leads to staccato twangs and jangling strums. Not only is the climax attained with a crescendo of volume and excitement, but the final theme variations are in contrast as stark and minimalist as the earlier ones are noisy. As guitars methodically clank as if reading a post-modern composition, and the clarinet lines emphasize atonal reed bites, intermittent stick strokes and toe-pedal pressure from the drummer concentrate the sound shards into the track's calm finale. **◎**




**Songs for the Breathing Walls**

► *Fray* (Free), the Czech born Toronto-based singer-songwriter Lenka Lichtenberg's breakout 2011 album, embraced the city's world music aesthetic and its musicians. *Embrace*, her outstanding new production, continues to explore and expand that artistic direction.

The title lyric of the Lichtenberg song *Peace Is the Only Way* is a central theme of *Embrace*. Its refrain is the personal motto of the Israeli violinist, oud player, songwriter and peace activist Yair Dalal. A leading musician on the global world music scene his ideals and spirit, bridging Arabic and Israeli—and other—divides, permeates this album. The spirit of peaceful coexistence among loss and struggle is also present as well in the earlier CDs, the live-off-the-floor

*Bridges: Live at Lula Lounge* and the *Songs for the Breathing Walls* recorded on site in the Czech Republic.

The main directions on *Embrace* are multi-fold: world music blendings, songs in the Yiddish theatrical tradition, klezmer instrumental touches and Jewish liturgy. It's all skillfully linked by Lichtenberg's effective song writing and unaffected vocals, as well as very effective yet unfussy, lush-sounding, instrumentation. Yair Dalal shares co-composition credits with Lichtenberg on the atmospheric track *Perfume Road* which begins with an environmental recording of birds outside the recording studio backing Dalal's free-metre Middle Eastern-inflected oud introduction, segueing seamlessly to Lichtenberg's crystalline singing of her own Yiddish lyrics. Also to savour: the superb performances by Lichtenberg's band, Fray,



and guest musicians comprising Toronto's world music and jazz scene A-listers, as well as those from beyond the GTA. Album guests include the well-known Hindustani sarangi player Druba Ghosh, violinist Hugh Marsh and Kevin Turcotte on trumpet.

Some of the same material is assayed in Lichtenberg and Roula Said's 2012 release *Bridges*, with many of the same musicians. The major difference here is Said's authoritative Arabic language vocal contributions and the inclusion of songs in the Arabic lineage. I moreover enjoyed the freedom and straightforward arrangements in this live concert recorded at Toronto's Lula Lounge, as compared with the tightly sculpted *Embrace* studio magic. This contrast is particularly clear in the extended open-feel instrumental solos in *Bridges*, giving the virtuoso musicians a change to groove and express themselves.

The deeply affecting album *Songs for the Breathing Walls* refers to the 12 historic synagogues scattered throughout the Czech Republic whose Jewish populations were decimated by the Holocaust. These settings of Jewish liturgical songs reflect the varying onsite interior acoustics of the synagogues, their outside soundscapes (on track 18 Lichtenberg remarks "...birds, cars, bells...everything...") as well as their history, intimately connected to their congregations. For instance, accompanied by a sole violin, *El Maley Rachamim* was recorded in a synagogue hidden within the Theresienstadt concentration camp. The personal connections are palpable in her voice: this is the place Lichtenberg's mother and grandmothers were interned during the Second World War. The exemplary liner notes with translations of the lyrics, photos of the synagogues and notes about their history add immensely to savouring this musical experience. It's an achievement for which Lichtenberg was honoured as Traditional Singer of the Year at the November 2012 Canadian Folk Music Awards.

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# Old Wine, New Bottles | Fine Old Recordings Re-Released

**M**ERCURY LIVING PRESENCE guarantees on the label that the recording, from performance to finished product, has maintained a sonic integrity that could very well mirror the Hippocratic Oath to “do no harm.”

The first of their recordings came to us in Australia on the HMV label and I can still recall the excitement generated by the astounding realism of the 12” LP of the 1951 performance of Rafael Kubelik conducting the Chicago Symphony in *Pictures at an Exhibition*. That performance remains a first choice in every respect. It mattered not that the recording was superior to the commercially available pick-ups and electronics of the day. Mercury has come a long way since then but the truthfulness of all their recordings remains and we hear what was heard at the sessions, without an engineer spot-lighting or rebalancing the dynamics as chosen by the performer or conductor.

**Mercury Living Presence: The Collector’s Edition, Volume 2 (0289 4785092, 55 CDs)** in a limited edition is now available, filling in some of the omissions in Volume One. (Issued 15 months ago Volume One is now out of print and copies offered on-line range from \$500 to a ridiculous \$1900). In addition to some usual repertoire items, including Beethoven’s Fifth, Sixth and Seventh (Dorati), complete ballets, *The Nutcracker*, *Coppelia*, *Sylvia* and *Le Sacre du Printemps* (Dorati, 1953), there are many composers and compositions that could only appear in a collection so diversified as this one. There are eight discs of Paul Paray’s superb performances of French music with the Detroit Symphony including a ripping version of the Saint-Saëns *Third Symphony* with Marcel Dupré, Florent Schmitt’s *La Tragédie de Salomé*, his own *Mass for the 500th Anniversary of the Death of Joan of Arc*, plus all the overtures and bonbons you could wish for by Ibert, Ravel, Gounod, Saint-Saëns, Bizet, Berlioz, Massenet, Thomas, Herold, Auber, Debussy and lots of Chabrier. Also works by Liszt and Richard Strauss. Marcel Dupré has a disc of Widor and Franck. Harpsichordist Rafael Puyana has three CDs containing works by Picchi, Frescobaldi, Telemann, Scarlatti and the Bachs, JS, JC and WF. The third disc, *The Golden Age of Harpsichord Music* from anonymous to Couperin le Grand is quite enchanting. Howard Hanson with the Eastman Rochester has no less than ten discs, eight of which are

devoted to American composers including, to my great pleasure, Chadwick’s 30-minute *Symphonic Sketches* that comprise four pieces including *Jubilee*. Also two volumes aptly titled *Music for Quiet Listening*.

And that’s not even half of what’s in the box. For detailed contents go to [deccaclassics.com](http://deccaclassics.com).

Today millions of people around the world, sitting comfortably in their local cinema, are seeing live performances direct from the **Metropolitan Opera** in New York City. Previous generations only heard live Met performances at home, sitting around their radios and for the most part not visualizing the settings but simply listening to the music and enjoying the artistry of a favoured singer and conductor.

Recently, **Sony Music** has issued a few single CDs of complete operas from the radio era derived from the Met’s own archives. Now they have a 25-CD boxed set of nine renowned performances of **Wagner’s** music dramas from 1936 to 1954.

The earliest of these is *Götterdämmerung* from January 11, 1936 boasting the incomparable Wagnerian heldentenor of the day, or maybe any day, Lauritz Melchior as Siegfried and Marjorie Lawrence singing Brunnhilde. Friedrich Schorr was Gunther and Ludwig

Hoffmann sang Hagen. Artur Bodanzky conducted. Lawrence made history when she surprised and thrilled the audience and horrified the Metropolitan management by mounting and riding a live horse into the flaming Valhalla. I had hoped that the sound on the *Götterdämmerung* transfers would be cleaner than the Naxos edition but it is not. Clearly they are each based on the same source. The valorous decision to include this performance was an artistic choice, not a technical one. The sound of *Götterdämmerung* is atypical of the rest of the *Ring* and the other five dramas which are all eminently listenable and enjoyable. As a matter of interest, the selection of the repertoire was discussed between the Metropolitan Opera and Sony Masterworks who came to a joint agreement on the performances.

Very briefly, the others are *Das Rheingold* (1951) with Set Svanholm as Loge, Hans Hotter as Wotan, Jerome Hines as Fasolt, and Jarmila Novotná as Freia. Fritz Stiedry conducts. *Siegfried* (1937) has Melchior at the anvil with Kristian Flagstad’s Brunnhilde and Friedrich Schorr as Wanderer. *Die Walküre*


(1940), complete with a wind machine in the opening, has Melchior and Lawrence as Siegmund and Sieglinde with Flagstad as Brunnhilde. Leinsdorf conducts.

Another Flagstad/Melchior collaboration is *Tristan und Isolde* (1938) and while the original discs are not quite pristine, the voices are clear. Bodanzky conducts. *Lohengrin* (1943) stars Melchior with Astrid Varnay as Elsa conducted by Leinsdorf. Fritz Reiner conducts *Der Fliegende Holländer* (1950) with Hotter, Varnay and Svanholm. *Die Meistersinger von Nürnberg* (1953) is conducted by Reiner with Hans Hopf as Walter, Victoria de los Angeles as Eva and Paul Schöffler as Hans Sachs. Finally, *Tannhäuser* (1954) has George Szell in the pit with Varnay as Venus, Raymón Vinay as Tannhäuser and George London as Wolfram.

This impressive collection of legendary performances, **Wagner at the Met (88765 427172, 25 CDs)** includes a 128-page booklet with historic photographs, etc., but of course, no libretti. The Met is quite serious about bringing their archives to life: Grace Row, the producer who oversaw the restoration and mastering of these performances, was previously a producer at Sony Classical in the 1990s and is now the in-house producer at the Met.

A similar collection of **Verdi at the Met** will be issued this fall...a welcome prospect of hearing further legendary voices in their prime.

In 1941 Deutsche Grammophon was purchased by Siemens Electronics and following WW2 in 1947 it was proclaimed that DGG, Deutsche Grammophon Gesellschaft, had formed **Archiv**, a special division to document Germany’s rich musical culture. Performances were to be historically correct in every detail with musicians playing on authentic period instruments following the performing practice of the time. Their first recording was of Helmut Walcha playing works by Bach on a small baroque organ built in 1636 housed in the Lübeck Jacobikirche. Those first sessions are to be found on the first disc of an important, strictly limited edition, **Archiv Produktion 1947–2013 (0289 4791045, 55 CDs)** that contains delicious performances of treasures from Gregorian Chant to Beethoven. Sometime after 1947 it was reported to “Mister Siemens” that the Archiv division was losing money. His emphatic response, I am told, was that this was of no concern as they were not in it to make money! Meticulously assembled, the early LPs were in fold-out jackets with a certificate enclosed, signed by the persons involved in the production of the disc! The 55 CDs are housed in a silver presentation box that contains a 200-page booklet detailing all the particulars of each disc plus a history of the label and lots of colour photographs of the artists. I’m sure many will find this package, subtitled “A Celebration of Artistic Excellence from the Home of Early Music,” irresistible...and rightly so.
